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WSHS students making a splash

Under the watchful eye of their teacher, Wendy Woodford, a group of Warwick State High School Year 12s have collaboratively designed a 12-item collection.

Abby Patterson, Hannah Buckmaster, Tahnia Smith, Teagen Hoffman, Cypress Wode, and Jessy Hollie make up the textiles class at Warwick State High School.

They were tasked with designing a single cohesive resort collection for males and females, suitable for a tropical Whitsunday Island holiday.

The project challenged students to use their imagination to create, innovate, express themselves and their ideas, and design and produce design solutions in various fashion contexts.

The first thing the students did was spend some time researching the Whitsundays, and the kinds of activities visitors might do.

Then they explored what exactly resort wear is, and how they might interpret it.

Students say they then worked on a colour scheme, after looking at the Spring/Summer 2022 palette.

"We got to pick two colours each," Hannah says.

They then decided on the kinds of silhouettes they would showcase in the collection, deciding to work on loose, unstructured designs that would be cool and comfortable in the summer and on holiday.

Wendy then chose materials and picked fabrics for each different piece.

She jokes she spent an hour taking photos at Spotlight so the students would have a big selection.

The designing and creation process wasn't without hiccups, and students had to change or morph their ideas along the way.

The material for Hannah's second retro bikini didn't work, so she had to make a shirt, while Teagen's dress was originally going to have a larger section Shirred but it kept shrinking, so she changed the design.

Other considerations were factored into the designs, including the "very important" decision to include pockets in the dresses.

While the students all made decisions together during the brainstorming and design process, they went away to make their individual pieces on their own.


Wendy says she was impressed by their teamwork and the support they gave each other.

She says she also had help from Judy Schimke, who lent a hand with patterns.

This also helped with the merchandising aspect of the class for the students.

Louise de Lissa from Rose City organised for the students to take accessories from other stores, and students say setting up was really fun.

"It was a really rich experience in the end to see all that work come together," Wendy says.

"I'm really proud of them."

The students all have varying experience and abilities when it comes to making clothes, but Wendy says they all did great work.

Abby went to Killarney P-10 State School until last year and had never done textiles before, but has learnt a tremendous amount in a short time.

The class made accessory sets last year, which they planned to show, but couldn't due to Covid-19.

Their current project is a denim jacket thriflipping, where they have to take out the back panel of the jacket and replace it with something else.

Leyburn Sprints tickets now online

Pre-event tickets for the 26th Historic Leyburn Sprints can now be purchased online, following the launch of an all-new website for the 20-21 August event on the Southern Darling Downs.

The ability to buy tickets before the popular event is a first in the Sprints' 25-year history.

Adult tickets priced at \$25 per day or \$35 for both days can be paid for and printed in hard copy at home or saved to a mobile phone, allowing visitors to avoid queues at the entry gate.

With the Sprints fast approaching, organisers have promised another bumper festival of motoring attractions on and off the track.

Up to 15,000 visitors are expected to pack Leyburn, a rural village 60 km northwest of Warwick, to see more than 200 historic, classic and performance cars race against the clock on a 1.0 km temporary street course.

Six-time winner and record-holder Dean Amos is entered to return in his Gould-Judd racer after missing the 2021 event.

He will be challenged by a group of rapid outright contenders led by 2021 winner and four-time champion Warwick Hutchinson.

The community-run Sprints keeps alive Leyburn's heritage as host of the 1949 Australian Grand Prix, when 30,000 people watched John Crouch win over 35 laps in a French-built Delahaye.

Seventy-three years later, the highlight will be the spectacular round-the-houses competition featuring cars from 10 decades of motoring – but other attractions also will be on offer to ensure a fun-filled weekend for everyone from enthusiasts to families enjoying an inexpensive day out.

More than 100 sparkling road vehicles of all types will compete in the Shannons Show 'n' Shine competition, while around 30 vintage caravans will bring colourful memories of long-past holidays.

Market stalls, trade and merchandise stands, live music and plentiful country hospitality at community-run food and drink outlets will add to the fun.

Sprints committee President Tricia Chant said the new website (www.historicleybournsprints.com.au), created by Toowoomba company Clevvi, answered the growing demand from fans to be able to pre-purchase tickets and buy event merchandise all year round.

"The new website carries over all key features from the past, including live results and photo archives, and will add new features as we continue to bed down and refine its

content," Mrs Chant said.

"Souvenir hunters, especially those unable to attend the Sprints, will find a great new range of 2022 merchandise and some unusual items such as a DVD of the 1949 Leyburn Australian Grand Prix and a reprint of the original program."

Proceeds from the Historic Leyburn Sprints are used to benefit community organisations

and projects. More than \$1 million has been contributed since the event's founding in 1996, while each year visitors and event expenditure inject an estimated \$1.5 million into the Southern Darling Downs economy.

The Queensland Government's Queensland Destination Events Program and the Southern Downs Regional Council provide financial

assistance to help promote the Sprints and attract visitors to the Southern Downs region. The 2021 event also was proudly funded by the Australian and Queensland Governments through the Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements (DRFA). The Historic Leyburn Sprints was named 2017 Queensland Motor Sport Event of the Year.

Leyburn's fascinating story

Gold fever, Cobb & Co., wartime spy flights, Queensland's oldest licensed premises, a famous footballer and, of course, a grand prix motor race: for such a small district, Leyburn packs an extraordinary history.

The 2021 Commonwealth census put Leyburn's population at 566 people, but there were times when many more found their way to this village 220 kms west of Brisbane.

The locality's first white settler, in the 1840s, was said to be William Gray.

His daughter Jane and her husband Henry Kirby gave it the name Leyburn, after a town in Yorkshire, England.

The site for Leyburn, Queensland, was surveyed in November 1852. Henry Kirby and another man named Collins (no relation to Mike and Ann Collins) applied in 1854 for the licence of the Travellers' Home Inn, then in 1858 James Murray erected his Coffee Room Inn and Boarding House. This became known later as the Granall Residence and remains in surprisingly good condition in Macintyre Street, opposite the 1863-licensed Royal Hotel. This property is now owned by Kyran and Janet Sprott, who are proud to preserve and showcase the history of this important feature of Leyburn.

The Royal and many other establishments were built to service a bustling gold-mining community during the 1860s, until most of the hopefuls decamped for Gympie, north of Brisbane.

Leyburn's post office and police station



opened in 1861, the State school in 1862, the Royal Hotel Leyburn in 1863, St Augustine's Anglican Church in 1871.

Farming and timber-getting mostly occupied residents for the next 80 years. And then the second world war came to put Leyburn on the map forever.

About five kms north of the township, authorities in early 1943 built a 2,100 metre airstrip for the US Army Air Force. Intended originally as a base for Liberator heavy bombers in the event of Japanese invasion, the aerodrome eventually saw flights depart on secret reconnaissance missions to south-east Asia. The Australian 21 Squadron, 23 Squadron and 99 Squadron also used the strip and Wirraway training and general purpose

aircraft were a common sight in local skies.

At times until it was abandoned in 1945, the Leyburn airfield hosted up to 1300 personnel, but it was to get a massive, one-off boost when the two runways and linking roads were used for the 1949 Australian Grand Prix.

Contemporary reports said 30,000 people attended the race on 18 September and saw John Crouch win in a French Delahaye. The Toowoomba Auto Club staged more races in the early 1950s, when future world champion Jack Brabham was a competitor in his famous Redex Special.

Today, plaques on Macquarie Drive commemorate the grand prix and the wartime activities, while more obvious reminders are the names on local roads – Delahaye Drive,

Wirraway Avenue and Liberator Place – and Liberator Park on the entrance to town.

Finally, the footy connection. With Rugby League enjoying an obsession throughout regional Queensland, former Broncos captain and State of Origin and Australian representative Shane Webcke is one of Leyburn's favourite sons. His reputation as one of the world's greatest players of his era has continued to bring attention to Leyburn, where he was once the publican and still has farming interests. In 2022, Shane joined the Historic Leyburn Sprints committee, as he is so passionate about the town that he wanted to broaden his support.

Leyburn, a little country town with a big and fascinating story.

Learn about Zonta Club's remarkable women

The Zonta Club of Stanthorpe's 150-year project, 'Remarkable Women of the Granite Belt', is well under-way.

The 12 women acknowledged, both past and present, have played important roles in the town's history and the project's purpose is to preserve this history and acknowledge their contribution to the community's formation.

Here's a bit about three of the women being honoured, with more write-ups about all the ladies to come:

MRS MARGARET ALLISON

(nee Dunkeld)

1843 - 1926, businesswoman, entrepreneur, community

- 1843, born Dumfrieshire, Scotland.
- 1873, moved to Australia and worked with her brothers at Wilson's Downfall.
- 1874, married William Allison later Postmaster at Sugarloaf.
- 1890, widowed and remained childless
- Became Postmistress at Sugarloaf.
- Over 45 years she expanded her Sugarloaf business interests from Allison's Store to the Tannery, the Steam Sawmill, Mines and her home at Allison's Estate.
- She was regarded as the largest tin buyer and dredge miner in the district.
- 1901, amongst her property interests, she built the new Stanthorpe premises for the Royal Bank of Qld.
- 1904, built shops and offices in the Allison Building in Maryland Street, later after a fire, rebuilt as the Cairnsmoor Building.
- Supported Stanthorpe Hospital and many other charities.
- Helped establish the Cambridge Ladies College, later known as St. Catharine's C. of E. School.
- Financed the building of the Stanthorpe Military Sanatorium at Kyoomba, acquired by the Commonwealth in 1918.

Widowed and childless, Margaret Allison became an extraordinary businesswoman.

She supported the advancement of women.

She exhibited honesty, integrity and determination during a lifetime of hard work and is remembered as one of Stanthorpe's outstanding women pioneers.

ISABELLA PETTIFORD (nee Pembleton) 1864-1947, nursing and midwifery

A highly regarded member of Stanthorpe's early medical community, Isabella Pettiford overcame personal tragedy to raise a family of 10 and provide invaluable service to the region as a midwife for over 25 years.

Isabella migrated to Australia in 1876 with her family, arriving in Rockhampton on the Scottish Hero.

- Married to Robert Mulligan at 16, Isabella bore 4 children.
- At the dissolution of that marriage, Isabella moved to the Stanthorpe area, where she met and married Alphonsus Pettiford, having another 6 children.

- Widowed for the second time in 1909, Isabella turned to midwifery to support her 10 children.
- Opened a Lying in Home for Ladies in High Street, Stanthorpe, opposite Dr Elwell's practice.
- Successfully operated this establishment for 23 years, under the patronage of Dr Ewell.
- Registered as a Midwife under the Queensland Health Amendment Act in 1911, Isabella stood in for Dr Ewell delivering babies at the Pines Hospital after his enlistment in World War 1.
- In 1924, Isabella opened a small cottage hospital at McGregor Estate.
- Records indicate that Isabella was still nursing in 1933 at 69 years of age.
- Isabella passed away at the Brisbane General Hospital on December 24, 1947 and is buried in Stanthorpe Cemetery with her beloved Alphonsus.

A tireless worker for the young mothers and sick of the region, a devoted mother and grandmother, Isabella Pettiford is truly one of Stanthorpe's Remarkable Women.

MRS MARY JANE GLEESON (nee Wren) 1869 -1963, businesswoman and service to Community

- 1869, born at "Glenelg Station", Queensland.
- 1885, Displayed excellent business acumen, established her first business as a seamstress, this greatly assisted in supporting the family.
- 1900, Married Edward (Ned) Gleeson, a blacksmith by trade, together raised 4 children.
- 1903, premises continued to grow, and more buildings erected.
- 1912, Gleeson's Emporium opened, covering a whole block in the main street of Stanthorpe.

The store included departments in groceries, men's and women's wear, shoes, household goods, haberdashery, hardware, ironmongery, and a chemist.

The store was lit by gas light. Mrs Gleeson knew the names of all staff and customers and was a deeply respected member of the community.

- Mrs Gleeson provided horses, and later trucks to pick up orders from town and rural areas and delivered them to outlying parts of the district up to a 40km radius.
- During the Depression and the Second World War, Gleeson's stood by their customers, and saw that children were not deprived, essentials were supplied on credit. Customers paid when they could, sometimes many years later.

There are many stories of parcels of baby clothes, nappies etc. being delivered to families despairing of how they could cope.

She was often repaid for her kindness with produce.

The Gleeson buildings still exist today housing 6 different businesses, one of which, Gleeson's Mercery, is operated by Gleeson descendants.

Washpool's founder and formulator Melissa Thomas said that when they first opened 12 years ago, the original goal was to make gentle, natural soap.

In terms of popularity, she revealed that their Goat Milk Soap was the customer's top pick, with varying fresh scents ranging from lemongrass and lime to lemon myrtle.

"We also provide vegan ranges and our coconut cream bars are growing in popularity, with the most popular scent being eucalyptus and wild mint," she said.

"Apart from soap, our manuka honey lip balms are a firm favourite and during these cooler months, candles are also extremely popular."

The move from Ballandean was a long time coming and Melissa said she dreamed of inviting customers to witness their products being made from scratch with organic raw materials.

"Our retail store in Ballandean was lovely but just didn't have the space to allow us to fulfil that dream," she said.

"The Reeves Road space in Stanthorpe is light and bright and big enough to include both a beautiful retail space with coffee bar and viewing windows through to our wonderful production space.

"We're big believers in keeping jobs local and try to source local products and services where possible, so it's been great to see the new space come together with an amazing team of local trades and suppliers."

Furthermore, Melissa said sustainability was a core value of Washpool and guided everything they undertook, including making responsible choices around raw production and packaging materials.

"Our aim is to tread lightly in all that we do," she said.

"We are continually reviewing our range and our focus in formulating is on increasing the number of waterless products we offer, such

as our popular solid shampoo bar."

With July and the winter months turning the Granite Belt into a tourist hotspot, Melissa confirmed it was the business's high season, but said Washpool also had a strong visitation even after winter.

"We get to live and work in a beautiful part of the country and we're thankful for that opportunity and the support of our local community and tourists every day," she said.

Having been operating in their new location for a few weeks now, Melissa said the space was already working exactly how they imagined it.

"It's been lovely to witness customers dropping in for some retail therapy and a coffee, sometimes with their four-legged friends, and the music and visual theatre created by the production team in full swing creates an amazing artisanal vibe," she said.

But the store was not limiting itself to solely

selling goods on-site, as Melissa explained that Washpool makes products for other brands that can be found in gift stores, salons and barber chains across Australia.

"We can now say 'yes' to many more requests for retail, wholesale and private label production, with the added benefit of supporting local employment opportunities with this new location," she said.

Local T Model Ford's film debut

Baz Luhrmann's latest film 'Elvis' made its Australian theatrical release in late June of this year, and transported viewers back in time to witness the rise of iconic entertainer Elvis Presley.

But in order to capture the look of the era, Warner Bros. Pictures required the set to completely transform into decades of the 1900s, and Stanthorpe local Ian Schmidt was called upon to help make it happen.

As the owner of two T Model Fords and a

workshop, one of Ian's vehicles was featured in the film, which was shot on the Gold Coast in 2020 during the Covid-19 shutdown.

Described by Ian as a grey 1925 T Model Ford Coupe, he said the film studio approached him after finding the vehicle on a website.

"I put it on a site where they hire movie cars," he recalled.

"Then I got a call from Warner Bros. asking if they could borrow it, which was an immediate yes - we just had to work out the logistics."

"It's a left-hand drive which is not too common in Australia."

However, the pristine vehicle Ian has been working on was covered in 'movie dust' for the film, which Ian said was to give it a rusty look.

"The scene it appears in is early on in the movie," Ian said.

"It's the car driving past a young Elvis running towards a tent, set in the late 1930s."

However, Ian said was unable to be on set for the filming process due to Covid-19 regulations and in another world without the pandemic, he would have been the driver.

"I drove it to the Gold Coast and they had someone else drive it in the movie," he said.

Although Ian only came into possession of the car seven years ago, he said he'd been interested in them since he was six years old.

"I imported the body (of his first T Model Ford) from the US and restored the mechanical parts I found near Toowoomba," he said.

But that's not all: T Model Ford owners bring their vehicles to his Stanthorpe workshop from all over Queensland.

"I work on them every day of the week," Ian said.

High school seniors striving for success

Four Year 12 Stanthorpe State High School students were selected for the University of Queensland's (UQ) Young Achievers Program, which aims to support their tertiary studies and career aspirations through mentorship.

100 students were chosen Queensland-wide, including soon-to-be graduates Megan Carnell and Freya Hill of the Stanthorpe school, and the former said she first became aware of the program in Year 10.

"To apply, we had to write a statement about who we are and our financial situation," Megan explained.

"Then from that, the school chose six people, whose applications got sent off to UQ."

The Young Achievers Programs involved the students undertaking locally-based, community projects, such as helping plant trees at Ballandean State School.

Other activities included Megan hosting a morning tea, which she said raised funds for a Cancer Support Group.

"I invited friends and family and we raised \$1000," she said.

"We also went to two residential camps on the UQ campus."

On the other hand, Freya said she was accepted late into the program.

"I got a random call in the middle of geography November last year," she said.

However, Freya assured that she didn't

answer the call during class and instead heard the life-changing voicemail later in the day.

"If any schools do offer the program, take it, apply, and make sure you go for it because honestly just being accepted into this has completely changed my life trajectory," she said.

"I know where I'm going now and I know I'm going to UQ to study architecture."

Similarly, Megan said she will be studying nursing and midwifery at UQ upon graduation, and that the program made applying through QTAC sound much easier than she anticipated.

"They went through scholarship options and how to budget," she said.

Another aspect of the program Megan said she valued was its focus on mentorship.

"As part of the program, you get put in a group with 15 other students and three mentors," she said.

"Every month your mentor will call you and go through how you're going with school and if you need help."

Freya echoed this sentiment and said she had gotten a lot out of participating in the program.

"They go into depth about uni life, what you need to do to apply to uni, your options, and stress management," she said.

"It's taken off some of the stress."

As a result, Megan and Freya said they felt more relaxed about the next step of their lives and career after high school, as the program set them up in good stead.

- The more you pay up-front, the less likely it is that you'll get into debt.

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

Featuring small-scale contemporary art quilts, the Australia Wide Eight features work by thirty-six artists selected by an esteemed panel of judges; textile artists Lisa Walton and Cathy Jack Coupland along with Sophie O'Brien, Head of Curatorial and Learning for the Bundanon Art Museum, NSW.

Visitors will marvel at the innovation showcased in the exhibition which features art quilts all made the specific size of 40cm x 40cm.

Size is the only similarity in the works with inventive approaches to stitching and creative manipulations of fabric sure to provide a superb viewing experience for all.

Louise Wells is an artist living in Inglewood, Western Australia.

Looking at the lost beauty in the ordinary is a major theme she explores, and this has led to more focus on the use of recycled materials, for their suggested narrative and concerns over waste and for the environment.

She uses textile techniques including dye, print, stitch, fabric manipulation and layering, often leaving raw, cut, and frayed edges to create texture.

"I live on the Perth Banksia Plain," Louise said.

"However it is rare to see a banksia on my daily walk.

"I notice the detail of the gradual blooming of this one specimen.


"As I walk, I contemplate that nature continues its cycle even while unprecedented events rage in our world."

In large part, the cast is perfect. My only



Music covers and consequences

The music industry is going through an interesting time right now, with social media changing the landscape like never before.

Once upon a time, releasing new music and charting was fairly straightforward. You went through a label, they spent a tonne of money on a traditional rollout, and voila you have a career.

It's not so simple now.

Artists including Halsey made headlines earlier this year when they posted on Tik Tok claiming their labels wouldn't let them release new music until they went viral online.

And while the pile-on of artists making similar videos straight after felt a little too coordinated, the proof is in the pudding.

A massive portion of new music is music that has trended online first, with Tik Tok arguably the main platform for this change.

Artists like Maisie Peters, Quinnie, Tommy Lefroy, Lizzy McApbine, Cassie Dasilva, ella jane, and more have blown up in recent years in large part to putting snippets of their unreleased songs on Tik Tok and building a following who would then go jump on songs as soon as they released them.

You just have to look at the success of the Unofficial Bridgerton Musical, which casually won a Grammy, to see the power Tik Tok has.

More recently, Aussie artists like Gretta Ray and Peach PRC have gone viral for covers of nostalgic throwback hits, which they then released.

Gretta Ray currently has over three million streams on her cover of Vienna by Billy Joel, released in May this year, while Peach PRC has gained over 600,000 streams of her cover of Teenage Dirtbag by Wheatus in a mere three weeks.

Lennon Stella's cover of Thank You by Dido, also released earlier this year, currently has over seven million streams.

Both Peach PRC and Lennon Stella's covers are Spotify Singles, something Spotify started doing last year.

Is it a way to help artists put our songs without the pressure of a massive release or album drop? Does it help artists in a time when their main income, touring, is still up in the air? Yes.

Does it feel a little like a more polished version of Like A Version, designed to make money? Also yes.

Nostalgia is bringing in the big bucks, and we need to talk about the ways playing into it is altering the industry.

On top of the rising number of covers, Tik Tok and Spotify are also changing the face of music by straight up bringing the old songs back.

Fleetwood famously charted again after a video went viral featuring their song, then Running Up That Hill charted after everyone on Tik Tok used it post-Stranger Things.

This year, Little Mix's song Power off their 2016 album Glory Days gained huge traction on Tik Tok after becomes a popular song for 'edits' on the app.

It seems harmless, and in a lot of ways it is, but it also feeds into the already-existing power dynamic in the industry.

There's a lot of debate about whether it's beneficial to have a label as an artist, but at the end of the day if you're an unknown artist with no connections you need one.

While all this change has allowed artists to gain traction without a label or pre-label, is it making it harder for artists with labels to justify releasing brand-new material?

Going without a label is all well and good, but having one makes your life a lot easier and

gives you a lot more access. And once artists gain traction and get signed on to one, are they going to suddenly have to justify every decision with their social media views?

Nepotism in the entertainment industry has been a big topic of discussion online recently, with an onslaught of videos discussing 'nepo babies' and whether more talented but less well-connected artists have as much of a chance of success in comparison.

With labels feeling like they're losing control amid the rise of Tik Tok and people exclusively finding their music there and on Spotify, are they going to only want to take on "safe" artists? Are we going to see a rise in nepo babies and artists from privileged backgrounds because of the safety they represent?


Are we going to see an onslaught of musicians with proven name recognition? Because you're either born with a name people recognise or you have to make it get recognised.

And it's a lot easier to get famous online when you have the wealth and resources to dedicate time to doing so.

Social media is giving people access who never had access before. Let's hope it won't be the reason that access gets taken away.

Mushroom dan dan

At the top of my grocery list every week are mushrooms.

They are not only a rich, low-calorie source of fibre, protein, and antioxidants but they are said to help lower the risk of developing health conditions such as Alzheimer's, heart disease, cancer, and diabetes.

But let's be honest, I buy them because they are delicious and quite honestly, I can't get enough of them.

Growing up, fried mushrooms on toast was a staple diet for me, but these days I have so many more uses for the humble mushroom... my favourite being my take on Mushroom 'dan dan'.

For someone whose job is full-time and then some, they are simple, packed with flavour, seriously delicious, and ready in no time; making them perfect for a mid-week dinner!

So head up to the Farmer's Market on Saturday, armed with your version of Mushroom 'dan dan' and pick up all the local produce needed for this one.

INGREDIENTS:

For the Dan Dan Sauce

- 2.5cm piece of ginger
- 2 cloves garlic
- 2tbs rice vinegar
- 2tbs soy sauce
- 2tbs chilli oil
- 1tsp sesame oil
- 3tbs tahini
- 2tsp sugar

For the Noodles:

- 450g fresh udon noodles
- 3 celery stalks
- 1 leek
- 400g button mushrooms
- 1 garlic clove
- 1tbs sesame seeds
- Coriander leaves
- Spring onion
- Salt
- Pepper

METHOD:

1. Finely chop the ginger and garlic for the sauce and then whisk with the remaining sauce ingredients and 1tbs water. Set aside
2. Cook the noodles according to packet instructions then drain and rinse under cold water
3. Finely dice the celery and slice the leek in half lengthwise then finely slice
4. Heat some oil in a large frying pan and then cook the celery and leek until softened
5. Meanwhile, dice the mushrooms and mince the garlic
6. Add to the frying pan and cook until the mushrooms release their liquid and then start to caramelise
7. Season with salt and pepper then remove from the heat
8. Add to noodles and sauce to the pan and toss to coat
9. Top with sesame seeds, coriander and sliced spring onions and drizzle with chilli oil
