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21-ish years of Robert Channon's Verdelho

Granite Belt wine country is known nationwide for its immaculate beverage offerings and in 2022, Robert Channon Wines celebrated 21-ish years of its esteemed Verdelho.

Robert and Peggy Channon established the winery in 1998, but before the idea of starting the business even crossed the former's mind, he spent 35 years working as a solicitor.

Born and raised in England, Robert said he moved to Australia in 1973 when his home country was in a terrible state.

"There were strikes and everybody hated everybody - we were working by candlelight, and it was just awful," he said.

Prior to Robert and Peggy making the journey to Stanthorpe in the late 90s (they had briefly visited the region beforehand), they both lived and worked in Sydney and Brisbane.

On a whim and a desire to escape the hustle and bustle of the city, they bought the land now known as Robert Channon Wines and the former solicitor said it seemed like a good idea to do something useful at last.

"I suddenly had lots of friends as a winery owner," he remarked of the venture.

"It was enormously exciting to start with and we gradually learnt what it was all about."

Robert's skills and knowledge of the business came from both working on the job and through a winemaking course but said his biggest help was learning directly from those around him.

This is where the story of the winery's Verdelho began, and it was a twist of fate that resulted in the creation of Robert Channon Wines' prize-wining beverage.

"The nursery supplying the vines couldn't supply the chardonnay we had ordered," Robert said.

"When we went to pick it up, we found out they had sold it to someone else, so we had to plant Verdelho."

And the rest is history, as the first three vintages of the wine would eventually take out the prize for Best White Wine at the Queensland Wine Awards for multiple years since 2001 and is a business venture worth celebrating.

Although it isn't quite the wine's 21st birthday (it turned 22 this year), Robert explained that Leisa at their Persian Poppy restaurant had prepared a delicious meal and celebration for the occasion, so they decided to celebrate it nonetheless.

"Over the years, there's been some steady and massive changes in the industry and the standard of wines has just transformed," he

And business is back at Robert Channon Wines, which includes their concerts, which were halted for two years due to the Covid-19 pandemic.

"We've had three (concerts) this year and the next one is on 4 September, with international pianist Roman Rudnytsky," he said.

"We love to see lots of people here and have live music back."


and many more, have some hidden gems just waiting for tourists to discover - maybe it's time for a road trip.

A group of local women participated in Brisbane Coastrek last month, raising muchneeded funds for Beyond Blue.

Colette Locke, Emma Day, Majella Roche, and Tanya Verri say their love for Zack Locke has always been their inspiration

With Emma's encouragement, they came together as Zack Lockes Flock, registering in February this year for Brisbane Coastrek.

They then spent five months promoting mental health and well-being, removing some of the stigma associated with mental health issues and raising funds for Beyond Blue.

"Whilst we initially pledged to raise \$2000 for Beyond Blue, the overwhelming support and encouragement from our very generous community as well as their appreciation for what we were doing very quickly inspired us to reach for the stars and raise our team fundraising goal to \$15,000."

Zach Lockes Flock organised and hosted several community fundraising events including a family premiere movie night, a cocktail night, a theatre comedy style interactive dinner, an artisan workshop run by Lynn-Marie Cremasco, the inaugural Festival of the Ox, and a wellness morning featuring a yoga session from Lorna Moore.

"We were continuously astounded by the level of support and encouragement we received and amazed by the sense of connectivity and gratitude our participation in Coastrek created within the community.

"We were amazed by very generous donations of money, time, effort and skills.

"Two very small generous businesses, Flowers By Helena and Fleur de Lys Cakes, donated money from every bunch and bouquet of flowers and special edition blue/iced cupcakes sold.

"What we initially thought was to be the highlight of our Coastrek journey, a 30km trek from Mudjimba to Noosa on July 15, was really just the icing on the cake and a fitting culmination to an amazing five months of fundraising and community support."

Colette, Emma, Majella, and Tanya started their 30km at 9 am on the beaches of Mudiimba.

"We were surprised and deeply honoured to be announced as The Most Inspirational

"This is a huge honour when every person on that trek has a story to tell and a reason to participate.

"Every step of the 30kms we took was in honour of Zack, not only for ourselves but on behalf of everyone who loves him."

As Emma wrote the night before the trek, "it's because of his imprint on each and everyone's





hearts that we want to do this and leave our footprints in the sands from Mudjimba to Noosa in the hope of helping Beyond Blue support anyone and everyone who needs their help whenever and wherever they may need it".

"We would have done anything to help Zack and save his life and we'll do anything we can to save someone else's life too.

"To help someone not feel that everything is hopeless.

"To save others having to know what it feels like to have to continue on when someone you love has left."

The group also walked in memory of Scott Locke and former Warwick & Stanthorpe Today Editor Jeremy Sollars.

The four women say they are grateful to have been supported and sometimes accompanied

on their walk by many family and friends.

"The trek was mostly on the beaches surrounded by the magnificence of the beautiful coastline while dodging waves and navigating water inlets.

"The last 9km had us climbing the hills through the Noosa rainforest to finish off coming through the Noosa Botanic gardens to complete our trek at sunset on the glorious Noosa esplanade.

"With over 580 teams and close to 2500 people completing the challenge, inspiring Trekkers stretched out in both directions along the coastline as far as the eye could see."

Zack Lockes Flock was the second-highest team fundraiser for Brisbane Coastrek, and sixth nationally, far surpassing their initial goal to raise a final total of \$22,291 for Beyond Blue. Emma was one of the youngest participants to enter and complete Coastrek and was the third highest individual fundraiser for Brisbane 30km Coastrekkers, raising an individual total of \$7500.

This total puts her as the 15th highest fundraiser nationally.

Three of their team members were named in the top ten 30km Queensland fundraisers, with Majella and Colette being placed 6th and 7th highest fundraisers respectively, and the entire team was named in the top 15 fundraisers.

"These tremendous results are a testimony to the beautiful, supportive and very generous community we are lucky enough to have around us and we thank every single person for their contribution.

"While Coastrek may be over our desire to make change and to foster a network of support and encouragement is as strong as ever."

The four women hope to host their next event "Colour Me Happy - Take a Walk on the Bright Side with Zack Lockes Flock" during October which is designated National Mental Health Awareness Month.

The event will be a fully inclusive, very colourful, family fun day with fabulous food, bar and great entertainment.

Zach Lockes Flock have partnered with Borderline Australia and all funds raised from this event will be donated to the sponsorship of youth and young adults in upcoming camps.

Cheryl has been looking after a "charming old gentleman" named Hugo for five years and started fostering seriously this year.

She says Hugo "came for a week five years ago".

The Jack Russell-type dog was considered for adoption a few times, but it fell through and he's now with Cheryl permanently.

Cheryl says this can happen, "where the dog just feels at home and know it's where they want to be".

Hugo is one of Southern Downs ARK's foster dogs in "retirement".

While Cheryl covers a lot of Hugo's costs, in the event that she does need assistance ARK helps her out.

Hugo was picked up by some travellers, in the middle of the road between Stanthorpe and Texas.

It's unclear how he ended up there, but he was brought to ARK in Warwick.

Cheryl met Hugo when ARK had a stall, and she says "it was obvious really that he was going to be mine".

After learning about the number of dogs being kept at a boarding kennel due to a lack of carers and thought it was "so sad".

She told Ann Simon at ARK that if they were ever desperate, she would be happy to take in a foster dog.

Hugo was handed to Cheryl after he was brought in, and he's been with her pretty much

Cheryl started fostering other dogs about a year ago and has taken in six dogs over that

She says she "didn't know if she had what it takes to be a foster carer", but now wishes she'd started fostering sooner.

She's taken in a Greyhound named Tyson, a Schnauzer named Tycho, a Beagle named Oakey, a Spoodle named Bobby, an Irish Wolfhound Cross named Buddy, and two Australian Silkies named Dusty and Drio.

While she didn't know quite what to expect, or what the dogs would be like, Cheryl says they've all been good dogs.

She says she thinks maybe this is because she's so calm around them.

It isn't without its heartwrenching moments but is incredibly rewarding.

"Buddy was hard to give up," Cheryl says. "But I love it when I see what's happened to them."

"The rehabilitation is quite joyful."

Cheryl has never had any of her dogs longer than four weeks and says ARK doesn't give you more than you can handle.

"If they know you, they know your surroundings and what you can take on."

To become an ARK foster carer, you need to be 18 years of age or older and live on the Southern Downs.

You can complete the Foster Carer Expression of Interest form via their website at southerndownsark.com.au/apply-to-foster/

Southern Downs ARK will need to come check that your property is suitable, and have proof that any other pets you have are vaccinated.

Carers provide a safe, loving and secure home for the animals in their care.

ARK supplies food and bedding. They also cover veterinary expenses and just require that you chat with them first and use their preferred clinic except for in emergency situations.

By becoming an ARK foster carer, you join a network of animal lovers, who are always available for advice and support.



60 Years in the Making is a celebration of the legacy of the Warwick Artists Group that grew from an idea tabled in May 1962 by a group of Warwick artists attending a regular catch-up involving painting in the open air.

The exhibition is a testament to the longevity of the organisation, but it is also forward-thinking, presenting the latest work by twenty-one of the current members.

During their lunch break on that day in May sixty years ago, it was unanimously decided to formalise the group.

One of the members, Dr Judith Best outlined some of the future aims of the club, which included creating opportunities to partner with other clubs, exhibiting in local competitions, and providing learning opportunities through engaging visiting artists.

The name was decided and the membership subscription of ten shillings a year

adopted.

Over the next sixty years, the Group would grow in number, creating many opportunities and successes for its members.

60 Years in the Making showcases the work of members whose preferred media is no longer limited to painting.

Fibre art, printmaking, bookmaking, papercraft and glass art are all explored enthusiastically at their base studio on Willi Street.

Part of the celebratory exhibition is a pictorial snapshot of the sixty years of the Artists Group which includes anecdotal information and rarely exhibited works by past tutors and members that have been selected from the Warwick Artists Group's own collection.

Group researcher Jill Birtwistle has thoroughly searched their archives sharing stories that plot the group's journey as an integral part of the culture of our community.

"Throughout our sixty years, we have celebrated the good and weathered difficulties", Iill said

"We have had our triumphs and challenges, shared fun, friendships, and failures and through it all managed to pull together many decades of art making.

Happy Hour is a refreshingly uplifting and wonderfully written story that highlights the nature of enjoying a quieter pace of life - even whilst some of us are in isolation - to demonstrate our values in community, showing how kindness, care, humour and wit are best shared and truly can bring out the best in everyone.

The Understudy by Julie Bennett, released earlier this year, is the new Australian book making waves.

With romance, mystery, power and betrayal all contained within these pages, this book should definitely go on your list.




Author Julie Bennett started her career working in libraries before becoming a former finance journalist and editor.

Looking back at Grease

One of the biggest, most successful films of the 70s that's had an enduring legacy is Grease, starring John Travolta and Olivia Newton-John as Danny and Sandy.

The 1978 release was based on the titular 1971 musical and the film's success has survived over the decades, making it one of the most iconic high school and musical movies of all time.

Star Olivia Newton-John's recent passing has prompted a look back at the film, whether it holds up and an examination of how exactly Grease became a cultural phenomenon.

The film follows Australian teenager Sandy (fun fact: Newton-John was unable to do an American accent, so they decided to make her character Aussie instead) who moves to the US and spends a whirl-wind summer with Danny.

After a heartfelt goodbye, the two don't realise that they will actually be completing their senior year together at the same high school. But Danny isn't who he appears with Sandy and is instead a notorious bad-boy who's embarrassed to act like himself in front of his friends.

This causes some drama between the two as Sandy forms a friendship with the Pink Ladies, which includes Rizzo (portrayed by Stockard Channing).

After many ups and downs, a lengthy dance battle and a flying car ending the film, Grease owns its campiness led by two massive movie stars who shine on screen. But perhaps what's been the key driver of the film's success is the songs, which are upbeat, catchy and timeless.

Whether it's Summer Nights, Greased Lightnin' or You're the One that I Want, the songs have taken on a life of their own and even if a person hasn't seen Grease, it's likely they've heard at least one of these tunes.

Despite Grease's success, one of the film's biggest criticisms is that the supposed teenagers are portrayed by 30-year-olds. However, Grease is certainly not the first film to do this. In fact, Hollywood is notorious for never casting actual teenagers – the 1978 film is just a particularly notable (and more obvious) example.

From a 2022 lens, the film holds up quite well but there are still some notable cringe moments.


Perhaps the biggest is depicting the two protagonists trying to change themselves for the other (even temporarily).

Danny is particularly insensitive and unkind to Sandy, yet she's determined to win him back.

Her final transformation into Danny's 'ideal woman' is a bit infuriating narratively, albeit iconic as it still proves to be one of the film's best sequences.

Olivia Newton-John was an interesting performer who pivoted mostly to music, with hits like 1981's Physical.

But it's undeniable that her role as Sandy in Grease was her most notable role and is a key part of her Hollywood legacy - a role that's sure to make it into a Musical Hall of Fame.

Hollywood's revision isn't a bad thing

While there's a plethora of articles online declaring that Hollywood has "run out of ideas", why are we so quick to demonise updating classics for a modern audience?

In recent years, we've seen plenty of remakes, sequels, and adaptations of older novels, but a good portion of the time this new media is far better than its source material.

West Side Story updated the movie by having actual Latinx actors playing Latinx characters, fleshing out the backgrounds of its characters, featuring a nonbinary actor, and touching on racism within the Puerto Rican community.

Remaking Little Women is a generational tradition at this point, and gets updated for that generation's values.

Greta Gerwig's 2019 adaption took this a step further, fleshing out the characters far more than they ever have been. Amy March in particular benefited from this and is now one of the relatable female characters in modern media.

More recent works benefit from this revision too. Panic by Lauren Oliver was originally published in 2014, and a series based on the novel was released on Amazon Prime in 2021.

The novel follows the teenagers of a "deadend town" called Carp, who play a game named Panic "because it was summer, and there was nothing else to do". The prize money is seemingly just a bonus.

While a lot remained the same, Oliver (who adapted the novel for the screen), made some fairly drastic changes including changing the

driving motivation of her main character.

Heather Nill, her main character, entered the game of panic in the novel to win back an ex-boyfriend. In the TV series, she enters the game because her mother steals the mother she's been saving over the years for college.

The love interest in the TV series is also completely different to the love interest in the books, with the TV's borne out of a minor character in the novel.

While the novel doesn't seem that old, publishing a novel in 2022 where your main character is driven almost entirely by goals centred around a male just wouldn't cut it. Honestly, it's boring.

The motivations given to Heather in the TV series have far more depth, and the stakes in general are far more compelling.

It could be argued that the plethora of sequels in recent years, like the new High School Music TV series or Top Gun movie, is purely driven by the somewhat guaranteed money it will earn. But if they're updating older media to suit a modern audience, or simply making the plot better, is it really a bad thing?

We've seen older media like novels by Roald Dahl and Enid Blyton described as problematic in recent years, due to them containing views from the era in which they were made that we no longer hold. Wouldn't it be better to update those novels for modern audiences rather than getting rid of them altogether?

That being said, this revision only works when you're improving your work. JK Rowling, here's looking at you. Please stop. None of the new stuff makes sense.

The Cox family purchased the farm in 2008 and at that time it grew hydroponic parsley. In 2010, they planted Garlic.

While it was Carole who first suggested pickling their garlic, former-chef Aaron got creative in the kitchen and worked on their Caramelised Garlic Balsamic.

The Caramelised Black Garlic reportedly came from an idea, a pie warmer, and a few bulbs of garlic.

The Caramelised Black Garlic is more subtle and sweeter than normal garlic and adds depth to any recipe you include it in.







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Creating lagom through Scandi design

SCANDI or Nordic design been pretty popular for a while now - and it's not hard to see why. With its focus on functionality and simplicity, this style appeals to people of all ages and lifestyles, and can be incorporated into your own home with a minimum of fuss.

At its heart, Scandinavian design is rooted in minimalism - without sacrificing comfort and beauty. This isn't the stark white minimalism you might have worked on previously. Rather, Scandinavian design features a lack of clutter, with everything in the space having a place and

There are no superfluous items crowding shelves, walls or floors. Furniture often doubles as storage to make better use of space and reduce clutter. It's all about 'lagom', the Swedish word for not too little, not too much.

You might feel that the structure of Scandi reminds you of other interior design trends, from minimalism to mid-century modern. In fact, it rose to popularity in the 1950s as part of a modern movement of Nordic design, according to the Washington Post.

But Scandinavian differs from mid-century modern in its colour palette. Mid-century modern tends to favour darker tones, while Scandinavian is all about light, bright and airy.

That's not to say you can't use colour at all. Scandinavian design uses earthy tones to create its aesthetic, including blue, green, blush pink and grey, in little pops of colour. Neutrals like white, black and tan form the base.

The Scandinavian aesthetic is also based on nature and the climate, favouring natural textures and tones. This means naked wooden floors, typically in a pale colour to maximise light, and soft, cosy textures like knitted or faux fur throw rugs and blankets to ward off the northern winter freeze.

In warmer climates like those we experience Down Under, these elements just add that extra dimension of comfort, even if you don't find yourself reaching for the blanket in midsummer.

It's also inherently democratic. Traditionally, this trend ensured that everyone could access good design, rather than just the rich few - look at IKEA as an example of this in practice.

To achieve a similar look in your home, look for clean, smooth lines in your furniture, light colours and soft textures.

If you're nervous about a large-scale resdesign, there's no need to go full Scandi throughout the home; it is possible to dabble by including some key pieces or colours. You could start with just one room, like the dining room, and swap your regular dining table for more neutral-tones and materials.

In the living room or bedroom, try replacing your heavy rug with a woven mat in a pale colour, or adding a large, round mirror to the wall to bounce light around the space. Linen cushions can help add that cosy feel too. Copper, metallic or industrial elements like light fittings can add balance to the design another central tenet of Scandinavian interiors. Ensure there is space around each element, so it can be appreciated in all its simple beauty and the air and light can flow through the room.

And remember not to overdo it, lest you lose your sense of 'lagom'.


