From Dalveen to the world

The Orion International Film Festival is screened in all the trendy places around the world Berlin, and thanks to the director's mum, Dalveen.

When the Dalveen Film Society revived the 1920s tradition of showing films in their local hall two years ago, they couldn't have believed that just two years later they'd be hosting an international film festival.

However on January 14 almost a hundred people attended sessions of the Orion International Film Festival at the hall. The event, the brainchild of Southern Downs/ Granite Belt born international film-maker Elliot Spencer will only be shown in two locations this year, Dalveen at the start of the year and the cosmopolitan arts city Berlin later.

Film Society president Jo Anderson said given the interest and success they are now hoping that they can host the festival each year.

"Elliot Spencer, who is the director of the festival, is a local and he'd been travelling the world," Jo said.

"He's a film maker and he's done all sorts of really interesting things all around the world. He's come back to Warwick, he grew up in this area, and he was really keen to do something locally. But obviously there's not a lot of places to screen cinema around here. It was through his mum that he heard about our film society

and he got in touch with us through our facebook page, came up and had a look at our facilities and just loved what he saw. He loved the whole premise of the little community film society and the fact that we have really good community support.

"We do have really good facilities, I have to thank the Dalveen Sports Club and the Dalveen Firebrigade for putting all that money together to put all the equipment in.

"So we just started, having conversations." Elliot had been running a film festival in Berlin for the past five or six years.

"The film festival runs in Berlin over their summer, so I think it's June/July this year," Jo said.

"The same film festival he will run in Berlin is the one we ran in Dalveen one Saturday night in January.

"So from Dalveen to Berlin. Obviously we've been running as a film society for two years and we've had two really successful years. We've had incredible support from the local community and the wider Granite Belt and Southern Downs, even people coming from Brisbane and Tenterfield and Glen Innes and Toowoomba.

"We've had wonderful support but this is the first time we've done something like this. I film festival is quite different because it's a festival that supports independent film makers. We ran it as a proper film festival.

"Elliot calls for entries he had more than 700 hundred entered to have their film screened and he went through them all. There were a selection of winners. We had a feature film which was a feature documentary in the afternoon then we had short films in the evening.

"Those short films were from China, Iran, Poland, America, Australia – all over the world and the audience members voted and gave some feed back on their favourite films.

Elliot is collating that at the moment and we'll announce the audience winners for those films on his website."

She said the event was interactive and wonderful.

After its first brush with a film festival (definitely not their last) the group will return to their regular monthly films with the Oscar nominated Mrs Harris Goes To Paris screening this month.

Matt Shields is a seasoned entertainer, experienced police officer and one heck of a talented busker as Stanthorpe found out last year.

The man known to his mates as Shieldsy took out the Busking Stanthorpe Title in 2022 making to the finals late last year where he came within a whisker of taking the Australia Title in Cooma.

He's back at Busking Stanthorpe on 4 March – but those intending to take part in the event (which carries more than \$8,000 in prize money) need not worry – he's only doing exhibition gigs and helping out.

"I came second in the final in Cooma which was quite a lot of fun," the man who writes comedic tunes these days (after stints as a rock muso and children's performer in his younger days).

"I was beaten by a duo called the James Brothers, they were from the Hawksbury Region of NSW and they were very good. They did a mix of covers and originals but in the final shoot out they did an original song and they played totally acoustically, there's two of them, one plays banjo and one plays guitar. They were very good, the judges liked them."

They obviously liked Shieldsy and his humour too if he finished second, right?

"Yeah, they liked me too," he chuckled.

"The Stanthorpe committee members who were there said 'you were ripped off, you should have won', but they're biased, just a little bit."

Second was quite an achievement in 2022 in particular with the previous year's state finalists also taking part in the event after their own final fell victim to Covid.

"So, winners from the previous year were invited to compete as well so it was almost like a final of two year's of competition," he said.

"So in the open category there might have been about 15 entrants when there are only about eight or nine heats around the country.

"So yes it's a great year to come second, considering I entered the previous year here in Stanthorpe where I got third and the artists that won it, 'Levi and Dad', were also in this final in Cooma so I beat them. Getting third to them the year before to beating them in the actual final it

was pretty cool."

While the music journeyman, who started a rockband at high school in Tasmania and performed kids songs on the Gold Coast before becoming a police officer, believes he is probably too old to make it as a musician again this time around, he admits he is loving being back writing and playing (though he admits it's hard with his still of comedic music to get gigs even in his home region.

"It's just fun to be involved in music again," he said.

He played bass guitar in 'Devils in Heaven' with a bunch of school mates back in the 90s, had a top 100 hit in the 1992 with original composition, 'Say a Prayer' and toured overseas.

"I've been there I retired from music before, I got back into it again doing an original kids show, threw in the towel again, this is my third go of oh that's right I play guitar I might pick it up and write some songs."

Allora woman wins scholarship

Former Australian of the year Grace Tame and the work of the Days For Girls group have proven a major inspiration for Allora-born university student Mary Higgins.

The Griffith University Psychological Science and Business student is off to Vietnam and Cambodia thanks to a New Colombo Plan Scholarship.

The program aims to lift knowledge of the Indo Pacific in Australia, with students supported to study for up to a year in several regions and undertake internships, mentorship, practicum or research.

Mary is passionate about ending genderbased violence (GBV) and hopes to learn how Southeast Asia addresses GBV, and how they support survivors.

"Growing up in Allora, a small town of just 1200 people, I've seen my community come together through droughts, floods and many other crises, which has inspired me to work further toward social justice on a grander scale," Mary said.

"This will undoubtedly be a rich learning opportunity both culturally and formally and I hope to build lasting connections with likeminded individuals to create positive impact internationally."

Mary said she's very excited to be heading off in June as part of the New Colombo Plan Scholarship.

"It's a signature initiative of the Australian Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade which strives to lift the knowledge of the Indo Pacific by supporting students in Australia to foster relationships and connections with people and professionals in the region," she said.

"As a part of this scholarship I'll be living for 18 months in South East Asia primarily Cambodia and Vietnam. I'll be undertaking some language training, a study component and then some internships over that period."

Mary said she found out about it through the Griffith's Honors College, a group at university that she is a part of who she says have definitely helped her, pointed her in the right direction and given her opportunities that she wouldn't known about.

Putting the application together, a process that took six months, made her think about what it is that has made her so passionate about ending gender-based violence.

"As a part of this process I had to figure out why do I want to go overseas and research this area and why am I interested in this field," Mary explained.

"And I suppose studying psychology I've really been immersed into that area, understanding people and why do they things. That paired with my upbringing and being connected with such strong women. I've been inspired to go down that route.

"I kind of can't believe that one in five women in Australia experience sexual assault and it's even worse for women in rural communities. Coming from Allora that's something that I hold close to my heart.

"Going overseas to Cambodia and Vietnam it will be a really great learning opportunity to understand, on a more culturally diverse level, how it is a problem and how we can, as a multicultural community, understand it and begin to tackle it."

She credits her strong supportive grandmothers, her mother and older sister Sally, who has been a real inspiration, in showing she can do whatever she wants to do.

"I also since moving to Brisbane, been a part of many clubs and university organized events which have also opened my eyes and made me aware of the problem of domestic violence and sexual assault in Australia," Mary added.

"In 2021 when Grace Tame was the Australian of the year. When she spoke it really shocked me and angered me that this was something that was still occurring and happened to so many women around us. I went to an event of hers at the Gold Coast – the Griffiths Honours College sponsored a couple of students to go to that event and I was one.

"I was really taken back by how she spoke and her story and obviously as the Australian of

the year it was really a great opportunity to her that message and the importance of addressing the problem."

Mary said she had always been passionate about gender equality, volunteering with Allora's Days For Girls group and then helped found the Amnesty International Group at Griffith University.

Within that group she was able to organize

events in collaboration with Allora Days For Girls educating Griffith Uni students about what Days For Girls do.

"Days for Girls are an international organisation that pack hand-made sanitary packs for women and girls in developing countries who don't have access to these items during their monthly period which means they can't go to school and work," she said.



An it's not all about books, as well as checking out the books and getting a chance to see what programs are available, visitors to the Southern Downs will also have a chance to check out some brand new magazines.


The library has some new magazine titles in their collection and are highlighting Australian ones, in particular on our library catalogue.

Killarney committee ready to go

Killarney Show is one of the focal points of the local community a chance for locals old and new to come together and enjoy what they have in the Seachanging region according to Show and Rodeo Society President Jan Hamilton.

And it's also a bit of a tourist attraction and some-what unique given that the Killarney Show Society has one of the very few grounds not owned by a council.

"I think the country atmosphere makes it special, the friendliness of the town," Jan said.

"In the past two years since covid, our tourists have been unbelievable, from Friday to Monday the town is just buzzing.

"We get heaps and heaps or tourists and we have a lot of new people in town, it's amazing how many new people there are now, bringing their own talent."

Held from 24-25 February the show starts a very busy few months for the Show Society. The show is held one week and then the following week it's all hands to the pumps again for the committee for another event.

"Killarney show grounds is one of the very few privately owned showgrounds in Australia, we aren't owned by the council so we have a lot of events throughout the year, we don't have to compete with the football clubs to use the ground," Jan explained.

"After the show, the week after, there is a big Horse Cutting Event – the grounds will be ready, but will have to make sure it's cleaned up from the show, we've got all bins empty and ready to go.

"Then we've got the big Killarney P&C Bike ride, we help with catering and then Warwick Endurance in April followed by the Indian Motorbike club's four-day event and then in May we have the Campdraft."

But first things first and the committee and volunteers are about to hold a working bee to

get the grounds ready for their biggest event of the year – their show.

"The show is 24-25 February and on the Friday we have a prime cattle section that starts early in the morning and goes until lunch time and then we have a rodeo starting at 6pm on Friday night," Jan explained.

"The pavilion will be open from about 2pm on Friday, after all the entries come in and we get all of the judging finished, then the stewards get to display the areas the best they can which is usually really, really good. And they show off all the talent in the community.

"Our cookery is really strong, especially our junior cookery, well every section is strong, but the kids really put a lot of entries in. Lego is a big section too. We've got a couple of different age groups and there's two sections, your own creation or a creation from the box. The one with the box comes with instructions but your own creation well it's just amazing what the kids come up with. It's a great display.

"The floral art is always really good and with this bit of rain around we might have a good display in our horticultural section, the cut roses and flowers. It was getting dry but now with this bit of rain it might be enough to bring things around in the next 30 days hopefully.

"The farmers bring in a good display with heads of sunflower, corn, lucerne and things like that, we always have a good display of their crops."

"That's Friday, the prime cattle, the rodeo and the pavilion opening.

"On Saturday it starts off early with showjumping which is a really big event, lots of competitors. We have all the different horse sections within the ring, the woodchop which is massive, we get really great competitors for the woodchop that starts at 9am and goes usually until 4pm and it's full on all day.

"We've got dog high jumping – you can bring your dog along and see how high it can

jump. That's really great fun we have two sections of that. We've also got The Big Bang Science Fair that's something new for the Killarney Show, that's something good for the kids. We've got the Bunnings area for the kids, Bushcare, the Age Care have a display.

"We've got a marquee which is a great place to sit in the shade, you can also see the ring from there. There's a lots of shady areas, the veranda of the pavilion is massive you can sit out on the veranda. The entertainment marquee is where the school choir perform, the local dancers perform and that's where we have a lot of give-aways."

She said it is still a true local community event.

"Oh it is and it's full on all day, there is

something going on all the time and of course you have side-show alley and what ever comes along with that."

Jan has been president "for a while" and thinks she's hit ten years but she's been so busy doing the job that she's probably missed that milestone. "I wouldn't do it if I didn't enjoy it so much, it is very stressful but it gets you going every day."

"The show is more work than any other event that we run throughout the year," she

Allora Show needs your help

Allora Show is back and celebrating it's 145th event with a show that the local show society hopes will be bigger and better than ever.

Allora Show Society Inc Treasurer Ian Tate said the show would start on Friday 10 February and takes in Saturday 11 February as well.

"We didn't have one last year, due to Covid restrictions, a number of shows early in the piece decided not to go ahead because of the way we had to deal with the community and people coming in," he said.

"We thought it was pretty prohibitive so we didn't do it."

Ian said as the shows follow a circuit, having their show later in the year may have taken competitors and events away from other regions which was something they didn't want to see happen.

But now it's Allora's turn again and according to Ian the committee was keen to have a show again though there was always a lot of work that went into running it and volunteers, particularly from community groups weren't as prevalent as they once were.

They have put the call out for other community groups to contact them and help

out and are happy to support the group's fundraising.

"Thirty years ago you'd have three times as many people wanting to help but it's just not the way of the world anymore," Ian explained.

"That is causing as a fair bit of grief trying to fulfil jobs where normally a community group, the scouts or someone would do and we pay them to do. Most community group has some kind of fundraising and we are happy to talk to them."

So what makes Allora Show.

"Each area has the way they do, we traditionally have always had our Bullride on the Friday night which is extremely popular," Ian explained.

"This year because of the help of Federal Government grants we do have a large indoor horse arena and we conducting our bull ride undercover. That allows us to put some, there is some restriction on who can sit, it's horse area not a stadium. We have a number of people we can put under that arena as well. But the big thing is it will be very visual from our bar and eating area. It's going to be a really good atmosphere where you have a couple of drinks talk to your mates and the bullride is right in front of you."

The main event is run by a rodeo association with competitors coming from all over however the committee run a local event for the kids between seven and 12 – they can nominate on the day.

"The bull spectacular starts at 6pm and 9pm and then we have a Brisbane band Route 33 who do come to the area a fair bit, they are coming to entertain the ground until 12ish," he said.

"It should be a very big night and hopefully the weather is kind to us. We are expecting a huge crowd, hopefully people will be keen to get out.

"Also on Friday we will have our prime cattle, there is also stud cattle coming in. We start our huge horse program on Saturday there are 600 events for the two-days. Over the two-days going to be a massive horse event.

"We have the Bullride on Friday night and then traditionally on Saturday night we then have smash up derby for those interested in that.






