FOCUS ON WOOL

Weaving her magic

What do you do when you have four children under five?

The answer surprised me – Learn to spin of course.

I met Judy Donelly a few years ago sitting on a street corner on a freezing cold morning in Warwick as I recall – it was Jumpers and Jazz in July and I had taken a few wooly jumpers (Sheep) to help this wonderful community event and do a bit of promotion for the Rare Breeds Trust of Australia at the same time.

Judy had her spinning wheel, I had the sheep and a local character who knew a thing or two about sheep offered to demonstrate his shearing technique and so we started a sheepto-jumper demonstration right there on the street corner in front of Sir Thomas Byrnes Statue.

In fact, you can see us do it all again in a few weeks at the 2023 event.

I met up with Judy again a few weeks ago at a local church fete, she was spinning and had a display of beautiful needle felted wooly jumpers, and me, I had the real thing.

I looked at Judy's collection of minature sheep, and one larger one which I recognised as a purebred English Leicester. The sheep were incredibly lifelike.

There were other needle-felted animals I recall, an elephant and maybe a giraffe, but being a farmer, the sheep really took my fancy.

I asked Judy about her life, when and why she started spinning and her answer surprised me – Judy's Mother-in-law suggested she take up knitting when her four under-five children had gone to bed.

After moving with her family to Gympie, she decided it was a natural progression to spin her own wool for her knitting and on a visit to the local butcher, she enquired if he knew anyone that might supply wool for her to learn on.

The butcher, knowing the local farmers of course, pointed Judy in the right direction and from there she discovered a local spinners group.

"It's an addiction," she says. "Once you start it's hard to stop. "I have, on occasion though, had the odd break for up to a year"

Judy enters needle-felting in the show every year. It takes her two full days to make her sheep. "I am a perfectionist," she tells me. Her fleeces are mostly given to her and Rose City Wools have also been a great source of wool.

I ask Judy what advice she would give people wanting to start needle-felting. I am interested to hear her answer as several years ago I

purchased a needle-felting kit of a beautiful beagle. What I have, half-completed, bore no resemblance to a Beagle at all. I got discouraged and gave up, although who knows, I might go back to it one day.

Judy says it is best if you can have someone show you – and immediately offers her services (I think maybe I should take her up on that one day.) There are plenty of videos on YouTube, she says, but it is just not the same as being shown and have someone there to watch and advise you.

"Oh," she adds – "and don't try to do this watching TV – the needle is very sharp with a barb on the end to prevent the wool being dragged out."

Bring on the Snowflake fun

Jack Frost is nipping at noses and the temperature is dropping rapidly - it can be only one time of year, Snowflakes in Stanthorpe time.

The bi-annual event, to be held from 30 June to 2 July, is on again and the Stanthorpe and District population are hard at work preparing for another bigger and better festival.

New Snowflakes in Stanthorpe president Trace Gosney, who has long been involved in the festival on the music and sound side, said it was all systems go for the winter family favourite event.

"We held a launch on Friday May 27 with over 70 people, sponsors, volunteers and supporters," Trace said.

Held at the Showground the event allowed the organisers to trial three brand new fireplaces (with toastie marshmallows for all) and another of the big Snowflake attractions – two of the three new snow-globes.

"The new globes are a little bit different, they're Snowflakes branded so you can take photos inside and have the snowflake symbol," he said.

"One of them has actually got a photo of Marlay the mascot. The globes are pretty popular, people love getting in there and we have synthetic snow inside them. We're looking to put some small blow-up balloons in one of them for a bit of fun." All Trace and his committee and volunteers need to do now is hope for the good cold weather that brings in the locals and visitors from across Queensland and Northern NSW for the event. After all there is nothing quite like Stanthorpe anywhere else in the Sunshine State.



"That's what people come here for, in summer they go to the Coast but in Winter they come to the big cold climate areas," Trace said. "Well, we are supposed to be the coldest place in the State."

He said there were a few changes to this year's event, promising more fun, frivolity and activities across the three days.

"On the Friday we have tried to make it a locals' day and we're not closing the street off this year," Trace said.

"We got activities happening in the Piazza and there's another stage down near Mitre 10. The big attractions are the chainsaw ice challenge later in the afternoon and at night there is the lantern parade and the fireworks from 5-6pm.

"Saturday, its all at the showgrounds starting from 9am. This year we've got two tiny sevenmetre-long blowup obstacle courses and a big blow-up climbing wall and we've got the synthetic iceskating rink inside. We've created a section for children's entertainment, a puppet show, badge-making, sand art, igloo building blocks - building out of big foam blocks. There's entertainment happening on the two stages all weekend, one inside and one outside."

There will also be an animal nursery, a snake catcher, assortment of markets outside and plenty of food with a LED Hoola-hoop Show and a Fireshow at the Showground on the Saturday night and of course the ever-popular man-made snow field - which will be open from 9am on both days. The local farmers, companies and supporters are already freezing their ice blocks in preparation and will be up early Saturday morning to get it all happening.

"There really is lots happening this year," Trace enthused.

"The Enchanted Forest is moving into the old tearoom, which is going to be interesting - lots of coloured lights - we can't wait to see how it turns out.

"We reckon it will be best one ever out of the five we've run."

Angelo is nuts about Snowflakes

Ballandean Estate Winemaking pioneer Angelo Puglisi is a local legend around the Granite Belt so it's little surprise he'd be involved in a community event like Snowflakes in Stanthorpe – also being a bit of a savvy customer, it's also no surprise he'd find one of the warmest places to be during the three-day festival.

When you think colder weather it's hard not to think warm food and one of those foods most synonymous with snow are chestnuts. So, you probably couldn't have Snowflakes In Stanthorpe without chestnuts and that's where you'll find Angelo and his friends.

He's pretty humble when you call him "chestnut roaster extraordinaire".

"Well, I've done it a few times," he chuckles warmly.

"If I told you what the secret is to a good chestnut you'd take my job," he jokes before imparting his chestnut roasting wisdom.

"All it takes is patience and determination to make sure that they get cooked correctly.

"You just have to wait until they start to peel the skin off and split a little bit. You've got to always cut them because if you don't do that they just pop.

"It's a bit like popcorn, if they get too hot, they just pop so you split the skin before you put them into the roasting situation.

"And then it depends on how you want to do

them, the old people use to have an old frypan that wasn't in use too much anymore, drill a few holes in the bottom and sit it on top of a nice fire. They have to get really hot, wait 'til the skin gets a little bit black, keep on shaking them so they don't burn on the one side."

He said the one big mistake that most people made was to leave them on one-side for

too long and that side becomes overcooked and hard like a rock.

"You want them to soften up inside – that's all it is, they soften up inside and they're great to eat," Angelo explained.

"I've seen them all over the world – different places – in Japan, well not only Japan all over France and even all over Europe they do the same thing – there is somebody sitting on the street corner with a drum, a fire drum and a frypan or some sort of container sitting on top and roasting away.

"You go there, they serve them to you nice and hot in a little paper cone or a paper bag, you put it in your pocket, it keeps your pocket warm, your hands warm. You put your hands in your pocket and you peel them without even looking at them.

"They smell pretty good; they've got a nice aroma to them."

Of course, you don't have to roast your chestnuts.

"You can split them and then boil them in salty water – boil them for about 20 minutes, get them all softened up inside and then you peel them, and they are nice and salty."

So where do they source the chestnuts for Snowflakes?

"Well, they grow a lot of them in Victoria at Bright and the King Valley area but they're growing everywhere," Angelo explained.

"There is a big patch of them in Tenterfield

once you've gone down the hill going into town from this side, as you go around the corner on the left-hand side, there is a patch of them there, great big trees. They've only just finished harvesting them in the past few weeks. People grow them everywhere. My father planted a few trees on the farm too and we had them for quite a number of years, slowly, slowly they got a bit like me – a bit of old age to them and got a bit wobbly and started to fall apart.

"But anybody can grow them."

Of course, chestnut roasting is not Angelo's only role though the other is a little more unofficial – bringing in some warm liquid refreshment for the hardy farmers and helpers who make the snowfield.

"I bring in a little bit of warming sustenance – I have to warm their hands up because otherwise they won't make any more snow," he deadpans.

"Trouble is that the mongrels have got hold of it and they want it every time now. It costs me a fortune. I tell them I'll just borrow some port from the people that can't sell theirs and I'll bring them that instead, not going to give them my good stuff," he jokes.

"No, it's a really tough job, it really takes it out of you, it's freezing cold, your handling ice, ice, ice. If you're not touching it with your hands, you're all around it. Everything is cold, the shovels are cold, the machine is cold, everything is cold, so they need a bit of warming up."

Mulling over a winter warmer

The Rotary Club of the Granite Belt create some of the real flavour of the Snowflakes Festival.

It's hard not to picture the festival without smelling the delicious aromas of roast chestnuts, mulled wine and warm apple juice infused with ginger that the club provide each year.

The chestnuts are arranged by Angelo Puglisi and Mario Marino will be arranging and are being sourced as we speak.

But the job of making the mulled wine falls to Perditta O'Connor thanks to a little competition held a few years back.

"There was a Mulled Wine Challenge held in Stanthorpe in conjunction with a live ABC radio broadcast at the Stanthorpe Information

Centre welcoming the start of winter and Brass-Monkey season," Perditta explained.

"A number of the current members of the RCOTGB were previously involved in another club and along with other service organisations - Zonta, Lions and others took up the challenge

to make the best mulled wine.

"Members of the public were our judges and after blind taste tests voted by way of gold coin donation for their tipple of choice. To my amazement I won (but it did taste good).

"We ran the Great Mulled Wine Challenge on a few more occasions and I was successful so now making mulled wine is my baby," she laughed. But when I asked for the recipe Perditta was very suddenly tight-lipped, though she did offer some clues.

"To make a good mulled wine you need patience. Brew it slowly so all the flavours infuse," she said.

"The recipe includes blend of good reds from the Granite Belt (usually Ballandean Estate); some fresh granny Smith apples also from the Granite Belt; perhaps fresh Gayndah oranges and maybe even a touch of lemon.

"Like KFC's Colonel Sanders, I have a closely guarded mix of secret herbs and spices that I add but these herbs and spices would do nothing to enhance fried chicken," she quipped.

Unlike some recipes Perditta does not add any other alcohol - some people like to add fortified wine or brandy or whisky.

The result is a smooth warming drink perfect for cold winter nights by the fire.

For those going to Snowflakes find the Rotary Club of the Granite Belt stand and see for yourself Perditta said.

"You'll also be able to purchase cups of warm apple juice infused with a touch of ginger - another local product and another great winter drop," she said.

The kids can will also be able to pick up some carrots to help them decorate their snowmen.

Shielded from loneliness

May is traditionally the month for the annual Salvation Army Red Shield Appeal with people attending the annual breakfast or donating at any of their collection points in Rose City Shopping Centre the following week.

But what happens to the money?

In the case of the Southern Downs and Granite Belt, according to local Salvation army officers, Captains Richard and Leanne Hardaker, the money not only stays in the area but it goes into growing a community and combatting loneliness. The main beneficiaries are those in need at Christmas time with vouchers issued for them to buy what they need at Christmas while the pair also have a major weekly event aimed at helping those that don't have friends or family in the area.

Richard and Leanne have been out in Warwick four years coming from the Tweed Coast and have been steadily growing their community by holding a service and Saturday dinner every week.

"It's a great community and when we first moved out here, we realised there were actually a lot of lonely people around, people who didn't belong to any groups," he said.

"Once Covid hit we just wanted to do Church differently. So, we have a 45-minute chapel service at 4pm on Saturday and we have a community meal after that at our base at 24 Guy Street.

"The dinner is around 5pm but it's all in

together, people come to everything and in the Chapel Service we teach things like self-esteem and life skills and how they are valuable."

He said the dinner was sponsored by the

Warwick RSL Club.

"They give us 50 meals a week, we just go there at 1pm and the meals are already ready," he said. "We just bring them back and put them in a hotpot or the oven or we just keep them warm until 5pm. My wife and a few other people look after desserts, so people get a main meal and desert and it's restaurant-quality meals.

"Last week, we had 64. It's a nice community that we are building here, and we try to highlight special events. Recently instead of Mother's Day we highlighted Women's Day and gave all of the women in the room a gift – a lot of them may not have had children or don't have children with them so we just wanted to acknowledge women in that sense."

He said it's not as much about helping under-privileged people as it is looking after the lonely, people who may not have family in the area or at all.

"A lot of people move to Warwick and think it's a great thing and they will be able to build community, but they don't know where to start, so we are a starting place," Richard said.

"We started out with about 25 people and over the two-year period its increased and we are averaging about 60 now."

The meal and service are held ever Saturday and there is heating in winter and air-conditioning for summer so it feels inviting when people arrive. And it is a diverse community with everyone from young families to retirees.

This year's Red Shield Appeal breakfast alone raised \$8000 to enable Richard and Leanne to keep offering the service and meal every week.

liquor licence? Do they have in-house catering or will you need to outsource this? Is there enough room to have a sit-down meal and a dance floor?



Mutton roast made easy

BY JUDY BARNET

Knowing nothing about rare or any other breeds when I started off in sheep, my choice of at the time was based entirely on meat flavour.

I stumbled on the Southdown sheep in the early 1990s and killed a couple for the freezer. I knew as soon as I cooked and tasted my favourite meal, Sunday leg roast, that there was no other breed for me.

I don't remember now whether it was a lamb (although not likely), hogget or mutton but it was sweet, succulent and tender.

It took me back to the roasts of my childhood cooked by my dear mum toiling over the wood stove.

It did make me think and I wondered why no lamb from the butcher tasted like the roast that day. Perhaps the word 'lamb' is the key.

Thirty years later I still only grow hoggets and mutton for my own consumption – I would never kill a lamb.

My mum laughed at me when I bought a slow combustion wood stove. She said she had a big celebration when she bought her first electric stove, with no more slaving over the hot wood stove! I love cooking, when I have time, which seems to be less and less often these days.

A high priority for me is to grow my own vegetables as much as possible. I still try to cook a roast on a Sunday, mostly hogget or mutton, and mostly in the wood stove.

It only takes me a few minutes to prepare the meat, having taken it out of the fridge 10 minutes before.

I cut a few pockets in the leg and put some small pieces of fresh garlic in and rub a bit of salt on it. Then I pick some rosemary from the garden and place it on top – nothing fancy.

I place the roasting tray in the wood stove, not worrying too much about the temperature as long as it is not too hot.

If it is a bit on the cool side I just cook it for longer. In an electric oven I preheat to 200 deg and cook for around 15 minutes then turn it down to 150. If in more of a hurry, it is just 180 deg until cooked!

I love to serve this with all the "P"s – homegrown pumpkin, potatoes, parsnip and peas!

Finally, resting the roast is most important. I give it at least 10 minutes before serving. And Dear Richie makes the best gravy!

The sound of engines returns to Carnell

The roar of engines has returned to the Carnell Raceway out Stanthorpe way thanks to the Short Circuit Motor Sports Association, lots of volunteer working bees and support from the local and motorsports community.

Current Association president Moss Lane (who somehow seems rather aptly named to be a motorsports president) said the track is up and racing and they are preparing for a busy time ahead.

The Association have already held their first Short Circuit race meeting late last month and are gearing up for the Big Chill bike race in mid-June.

"When the Short Circuit Motor Sports Association was formed in '97, I was around then," Moss, who is based in the Moreton Bay area and is a life-long motor sports enthusiast, said. He said his name is a corruption of Morris and when asked if his dad, who introduced him to the sport and raced motorbikes, was a fan of famous racing identity Stirling Moss, he laughed – obviously not the first time he'd been asked.

Moss has been a long-term member of the Association and is pleased to finally see it find a home.

"I was president in the earlier days (of the oup) but work and life got in the way and I was out of it for a little while. And then in recent times the long-term president stood down and I took over again, that was a couple of years now. "Since then, we had the Carnell Raceway presented to us as an option to take over. We have spent the past 12 months working on the track and we've got it under control now. We've taken the complex over as our home track, we're working on reorganising the track and have built it up to a point where it's a little bit more user-friendly. We've done a lot of work on some of the safety items and the track and stuff like that.


