

# Sharyn finds balance in the vines

Life balance – it's something we hear a lot about but Japanese teacher and winery employee Sharyn Fujie believes she's found it.

These days the semi-retired Warwick High teacher divides her time between working at the school, at the cellar door at Bent Road Winery in Ballandean and running her picnic basket business Cheese Witch.

It's the best of all worlds for Sharyn, whose idea of the perfect meal is eating beautiful local produce and drinking equally impressive local wine in the shadow of the vines.

"I just like cheese and I like doing interesting food and wine matching with cheese and making cheese even more delicious than it already is," she said laughing as she explained the name of her business.

"I'm a teacher by trade but I also work at the Bent Road Winery Cellar Door."

"The picnic baskets are the way we provide food to the customers that come for wine tasting. They can taste wine and then also have a picnic basket and sit out among the vines. They can grab a bottle of wine and have a picnic out there."

"Basically, I source the contents of the picnic hampers from local artisans."

The hampers include products from: Choose Dairy Free vegan cheeses; Stanthorpe Cheese Co; Premier Meats Tenterfield; Ballandean Bakery; Jamworks Gourmet Foods as well as local fruits and greens.

"Premier Meats at Tenterfield do amazing smoked charcuterie" she said.

"We've got Stanthorpe Cheese, which is just the most delectable cheese, we have the whole range of their cheeses. We have condiments from Jamworks – sweet and savoury as well as bread baked by the local baker in Ballandean, which is where the winery is. And then there are fresh organic greens from local gardens."

So how did she go from teaching to Cheese witchery?

"I just saw that there was a real need," Sharyn explained.

"We've got something like 55 wineries in the area – within a 40–50-kilometre radius – but really not enough places for people to eat. A vineyard to me is the perfect spot for

a picnic, they're gorgeous, they're romantic and beautiful. The scenery is stunning and you've got the beautiful vines."

"If you've got a bottle of wine and you're sitting under a grapevine with grapes on it that have been used to make the wine, you just can't beat it."

"To sit there with a beautiful locally sourced picnic is my idea of heaven."

"It is just such a lovely way to relax. People don't necessarily want to sit in a restaurant and have a formal meal. I just think on beautiful day when you are sitting outside under the vines just with one or two people, or a group it's just so relaxing. You can lay on the ground, you've got your

picnic basket, you've got your blanket, you've got everything you need. You don't have to be sitting in a restaurant, you can enjoy the vineyard."

Sharyn said her business was going pretty well.

"Well, enough," she laughed.

"It's only a very tiny thing. It's more like a hobby really but it's just something I think we really need in the area and people really do love it."

And while you can usually mostly find Sharyn's Cheese Witch baskets at the winery, she will be providing food for this year's Shakespeare Under the Stars.

"Again, because that's an outdoor event,

it's perfect," she said.

"I really like supporting locally made products and I think if people are going to come and visit an area they should try the local produce and we've got some fantastic local produce."

"Everybody has been really supportive and their products are absolutely beautiful. I'm really glad to promote them. And also, because I'm based at a winery and I work at a winery, I know the wines really well, I can match them. I know they wines are perfectly matched for picnics."

## Dance group rises to the occasion

For those who danced as a child, there was something special about practising for weeks, perfecting a routine and then proudly getting up on stage in front of friends and family.

It was a great feeling and one that not a lot of people get to experience into adulthood. However, the adult dancers at the Warwick-based Rise - Freestyle Warriors know just what it feels like and a little later this month they will be experiencing it again but this time under the stars and as part of Stanthorpe Little Theatre's Shakespeare in Shorts.

The group, under the watchful eye of dance principal Kylie Wright, have learned medieval-style dancing to add an extra dimension to this year's Shakespeare event and add yet another style to their repertoire.

"It's been really interesting," Kylie laughed.

"The Shakespeare opportunity has been lots of fun, and quite interesting for us. It's been good."

"We were very fortunate, we are working with Annie on a separate project at the moment and we got talking and she found out that I've been dabbling in medieval dancing."

Rise is a labour of love for Kylie.

"Rise has been operating in Warwick for about eight or nine years now," she said.

"We just a small dance studio. We don't do competitions and we just dance for the enjoyment of it. I have a class that's suited for kids and I've got a class for adults and we explore many, many, many different dance styles."

Rise came about when a friend of Kylie's approached her about starting a dance troupe.

"She convinced me to go along with her, so we started Rise in the Baptist Church Hall in Warwick and then when she moved to Hervey Bay, I took it over by myself," Kylie said.

The group currently now has between 20 and 25 dancers, around 10 kids and teens and 10 adults, give or take a couple. The group dance to have fun, to enjoy a laugh week to week and to enjoy performing.

Though for many of them, Kylie's plan came out of left field.

"They laughed at first when I told them," she giggled.

"Then they went – what? But they are use to all my idiosyncrasies and all the weird things that I like to experiment with so they really weren't that surprised.

"We learn about nine dances a year and we also practise old ones as well. This particular number that we've been doing for the Shakespeare, we've been working on that for a couple of months now."

"It's not one of our more complex ones but it certainly looks really pretty when you sit back and watch it because traditionally, your more medieval style was repetitive, so when I choreographed it I attempted to make parts of it quite representative of the time and then for fun I threw in some hip-hop right in the middle of it. It's a fusion of hip-hop and medieval time dancing," she sniggered.

Because of busy life schedules, the

dancers involved in the performances will vary from show to show.

"Over the course of the three to four performances about eight of my dancers are able to come but not all at the same time unfortunately. We will always about three to four of us but rotating. However, everybody has stepped-up and pitched in to try to make this the best we can. It's going really well, it's looking really good and we've got our costumes ready."

Rise will pop up mainly in the second half during the monologue section of the show.

"From what I understand we are pretty soon after the interval and then we are on again a bit later after some of the monologues."

"I haven't actually been privileged enough to get to Shakespeare Under the Stars before but I'm a massive history buff, we go to the Medieval Festival every year, my family and I. We enjoy going and seeing the re-enactors."

"So it was really lovely to get the opportunity to go down and not just see it, but experience it."

"We're really excited. November is a big performance month for us so we've just

been having a really quiet rest and then it's full tilt into November."

"We had a show in Warwick on November 4 which was called Time Vorp and we collaborated with the local burlesque studios from Warwick and Toowoomba under the banner of the Rose City Soiree to basically put on a variety concert for grown-up performers. There aren't that many opportunities for adults to learn and perform unless you are at the top of your field. There aren't a lot of chances for adults just to have a good time on a stage these days."

"Dance is for movement, it's for enjoyment and it's one of the most fun things you can do. I love dance so much, I'm so passionate about dance in all its forms."

Kylie herself has been dancing for more than 30 years, starting off as a young child, though her path to dance teaching didn't take the stereotypical ballet or jazz route.

"I started off with Highland Dancing as a kid and then when I hit my teen years I decided to branch out into a few different things like ballroom, salsa and belly dancing. Eventually when I hit my 30s I started ballet, jazz and tap and all of those sorts of things. I've just continued to add to my dancing knowledge."

"And now it's medieval dancing. I've been watching videos and doing research online and all that kind of stuff to find the types of styles and steps and things that they would have done at the time."

"It was really interesting to do the research. I'm very fortunate that a lot of re-enactors are very clever and they've done a lot of hard work. They've put the research out there on the internet so I didn't have to go crawling through old texts or anything to try and piece it together."

"A lot of the re-enactors are so thorough in what they do I was able to go in and tap into what I needed."

# Bard under the Stanthorpe stars

To Be or Not To Be – there's no question, Stanthorpe Little Theatre is definitely going to be performing Shakespeare this month.

This time around, if you hadn't guessed, it's Hamlet's turn to grace the stage (if it rains) or the grounds of the Little Theatre in Connor Street, Stanthorpe, if it doesn't.

The performance "Stanthorpe Little Theatre presents – In Shorts - Shakespeare Under The Stars, A delightful program of Hamlet directed by Annie Mitchell" will also include a second half of favourite Shakespearian monologues by well-known local performers directed by Chris Desgrande and Medieval Dance performed by Rise Freestyle Warriors.

It's a welcome return for a much-loved part of the Southern Downs and Granite Belt entertainment calendar.

"It's been going for 17-18 years, I don't think it's quite 20 years – but it's a long time," director Annie Mitchell explained.

"This time we're doing it at the theatre itself – just outside the theatre. And this time around we are doing some shortened versions.

"We have a shortened version of Hamlet – Hamlet in just under an hour. Then we are doing monologues. Some of the prominent actors and actresses of the district have chosen favourite monologues from various plays. That will be in the second half. We are also very lucky to have Rise Warriors Dance Troupe. They've been studying different types of dances through out the ages and I happened to hear someone talking about this and I said "oh would you like to perform?" so they're going to two medieval dances. It's very exciting."

Annie said rehearsals have been going "fantastically" and all the performers are looking forward to performing for the crowds later in the month.

"One of the reasons we chose to do some shortened versions was that Shakespeare is quite a dense performance to do as far as performance and the time commitment needed from actors," she said.

"We start in July, and we've been going since then."

She said with a big time commitment needed to rehearse and a lot of lines to learn they had been having trouble finding actors who were able to come the two to three nights for four months to rehearse.

"It's a big commitment," Annie said.

"We just weren't able to do that. So, we

decided to do something that was shortened. It's less time commitment and less lines and that was more attractive to people.

"They could commit to one night a week."

And there are a lot of new faces this time around too.

"In the Hamlet portion of the night, they are all new to Shakespeare, which is very exciting.

"And we have a lot of young people too.

"Shakespeare is something that we always encourage our younger actors to get involved with just to see if they like it. A lot of them maybe have one or two lines like "a message sire", there may be some waiting, but they still get the whole experience of what it's like being part of a performance, dressing up, putting all that make on, knowing when their lines and when their cues are. And can I just say our young actors are magnificent, everyone has learnt their lines beautifully, their projection is great, they've worked so hard, I'm very very proud of them."

"That's where our life blood is, in all community groups you need young people to be involved and see the value in it."

And what many people seem to forget when they watch performances of British actors in their 30s and 40s in the prime of their acting powers brood at a skull is that Hamlet was basically a university student.

"Our Hamlet is actually 17 which is exactly how old Hamlet was – just out of school," she said.

The other interesting thing about the Little Theatre's Hamlet, from the titular character to the bulk of the rest of the cast, is that it harks back to the original performances – but with a twist.

"Sky Fern plays Hamlet, it's her first big production, she's done magnificently, she committed to cutting her very short."

"The other thing is we haven't been able to get very many men so there's a lot of trousers roles. It's quite the role reversal from Shakespeare's time when lots of men were playing women. We've got lots of women playing men so that amuses me."

"A lot our women actors who are doing men's roles have had to have boy training."

"How do you walk you like a boy, how do you stand?"

"(When rehearsing) I will just yell out "girl" I can see a girl on a stage. That makes them laugh. Doing that friendly banter, how boys greet each other – they've all had to study that. I said don't be creepy about it but go and watch how men greet each other, that's what you've go to do."

The second half of the shows will focus on some of the great monologues from throughout Shakespeare's works.

"We have the St Crispin's Day speech from Henry V, we've got Queen Margaret doing something, we have Shylock's main speech we have Portia from Merchant of Venice as well," Annie enthused.

"I'm going to do the witches monologue from Macbeth – there is a broad range."

"Christopher Desgrande is doing St Crispin and he's always just magic."

Shows will be held on November 11-12 and 18-19 with a VIP performance on Friday November 10. Show starts at 7pm. To book visit the Stanthorpe Little Theatre's website stanthorpelittletheatre.org.au or visit Gracious Giving on High Street.

# Help needed for centre's next phase

It opened back in August after 18 months of hard work from the community and volunteers but for Protea Place Warwick the real work is just beginning.

New sub-committee member, well-known Warwick community member Tracy Vellacott said even though it had only been opened just on three months the centre, housed in the old Uniting Church manse building, is already proving to be a valuable community asset.

Protea Place Warwick, which receives no government funding and is open eight hours a week, aims to provide an additional layer of support to women experiencing homelessness, disadvantage, isolation, and domestic and family violence.

"It is up and running and it's been going really well since our opening," Tracy said.

"The numbers are increasing each week, which is unfortunate in one sense but the word is definitely getting out and other services are referring vulnerable women as well as the word-of-mouth referrals.

"We are only open eight hours a week across two days, so four hours each day and all of that is dependent, moving forward, on how much we can raise to not only keep operating at the existing level and possibly extend those services to more days."

Protea Place is currently open Tuesdays and Thursdays between 10am and 2pm and lunch is served at noon.

While the centre does not offer on-site accommodation, one of its primary goals is to assist women in accessing housing solutions. Protea Place aims to provide practical support, including hot meals, laundry facilities, clothing, toiletries, and connections to relevant support services. The centre is there to offer a safe and caring environment where women can find respite and guidance during challenging times.

It is essentially a drop-in centre for vulnerable women.

"You have to knock on the door to be seen but at the moment we're seeing approximately 15 women on-site in a week, potentially those numbers are increasing as the word gets out," Tracy said.

"I guess it's important to realise that each case is unique and complex and they require a lot of time and expertise from Jo our staff

member to assist with, and achieve the outcomes that they need. This is particularly true with the way housing is in the current climate. There's a big shortage in Warwick as there is in many regional communities or any communities really."

The complexity of cases can require time as staff deal with anything from housing to DFV to mental health.

"Only being open eight hours per week across those two days means that we are trying to get through a high volume of complex work in a short amount of time," Tracy explained.

"We are definitely seeing a lot of older women who are homeless and, of course, women who are homeless as a result of domestic violence."

However, the centre is already having successes.

"One of the wins this week that Amanda (Toowoomba-based Protea Place's founder and CEO) and Jo were really excited about was an elderly lady, who has been homeless and in her car for almost 12 months. She visited Protea Place Warwick for the first time on Tuesday and within just a few hours our team leader Jo had secured some safe and affordable accommodation for her."

"We talk about dignity, and Amanda said we were able to wrap her up in a massive amount of integrated dignity, housing and health support."

And while the setting is up all done and dusted the centre is still on the fundraising bandwagon.

"We have secured funding to operate for our first 12 months but our on-going challenge is to raise those continual funds and awareness about the service, to be able to have longevity for this program in our community for those vulnerable women who need it," she said.

"And while money to operate is always front of mind, we also love donations of toiletries, nonperishable food items, toilet paper, all of those sorts of things which help .

"The other great thing that Protea Place Toowoomba have is what they call Rent Sponsors. We'd ask if there is anyone out there or any businesses out there who'd love to come on-board as rent sponsors. It means that the rent is covered and the funding that would ordinarily be set aside for rent can be diverted to other parts of our program in

Warwick."

Of course support is continuing from the community and of the big things that the committee was super-excited about in recent weeks the Warwick Show and Rodeo Society coming onboard during the rodeo and campdraft to run an art union initiative.

"The proceeds of that art union will go to Protea Place so there have been a lot of people out there selling art union tickets because the more we sold the greater the benefit to Protea Place," the sub committee member said.

"We're incredibly grateful to Warwick Show and Rodeo Society for choosing Protea Place as their inaugural Art Union recipient."

As well as raising much needed funds, the Art Union has also been a great PR exercise, with the committee working with the Warwick Show and Rodeo Society to get the Protea Place organisation, messaging and what they do out into the community.

Representatives spent time at the bottom of the escalators at Rose City Shopping Centre in the lead-up to the rodeo selling art union tickets and talking to the general public about what the service provides and how it can help.

"I had a conversation with a lady, she really wanted to know what we were providing on the ground and I spoke about the dignity services," Tracy said.

"We recognise that it's not an answer as such (to homelessness), it's not a shelter where people can stay but our team will work really hard so that we can try to find a solution to your housing issues."

"In the meantime, it's that safe place to come, it's that place to have a showers, wash clothes, have a hot meal, have companionship if you need it as well."

"Or there are beautiful spaces in the home to just break out and just be by yourself if that's what you need - some quiet time. The centre itself is very homely and gentle and quiet if you need it and there are clients coming through all the time, so perhaps there is a comrade there for some conversation as well."

"Amanda has said to me that Protea Place is there for women on probably one of the hardest days of their lives when they are having to acknowledge that they are in this situation and to put their hand up and ask for some help."

So why did Tracy put up her hand to help?

"I recognise that there for the grace of god go, I live a fortunate life and I don't have to deal with this but my empathy for the women who do, well I'm the greatest cook out," she said.

"When you think organisations like Protea Place get no government funding, they have to rely a hundred per cent on philanthropic support, grants or community donations. Why is our system this broken?"

"I think that's part of Protea Place's success, there is a very real emotional attachment to what is going on in the ground in our communities. I take my hat off to the incredible work that Amanda and her team are doing in Toowoomba and Jo and the team in Warwick are doing. I'm very, very grateful and if I can play a little part along with the rest of the people in our sub-committee and the Toowoomba committee - I guess our job in a way is to leverage the skills we have to try and help the organisation."

"We have been very grateful for the Warwick Credit Union support, they've certainly taken us under their wing and were running community donation drops," Tracey said.

And while Protea Place is moving forward Tracy said the centre was very grateful to every one who got the centre to where it is now.

"We owe a huge thank you to all of the individuals, the businesses, the community groups that have jumped onboard the Warwick Protea Place journey so far because the reason that there is this incredible place for women to go is because the initiative received love and support from the community," she said.

"But as Amanda says we really need everyone to stay onboard, to keep supporting and advocating to their contacts to keep supporting Protea Place."



# Domestic violence in sharp focus

Vanessa Fowler OAM lived every sister and aunt's nightmare when she lost her sibling Allison Baden-Clay and Allison's children to domestic violence.

Now she is the co-chairwoman of the Domestic and Family Violence Prevention Council. She will be one of the keynote speakers and will be involved in a Q&A session at a series of events in Warwick and Stanthorpe this month aimed at discussing coercive behaviour.

Vanessa will be joined by former Queensland police commissioner Bob Atkinson for the four presentations and Q&A sessions.

The events are being presented by the Women's Action and Advocacy Team Southern Downs (WAAT) in collaboration with the State Department of Women's Safety and Violence Prevention, Warwick and Stanthorpe Zonta Clubs, Warwick Chamber of Commerce and SDRC to bring these important DFV Community Education sessions to our community on November 9 (Stanthorpe) and November 10 (Warwick).

Two free events will be held at Stanthorpe Civic Centre on November 9 at 11 am and 6pm and at Warwick RSL from 7am and Warwick Town Hall at 11am on November 10.

WAAT is the brainchild of Sue Hamlet, Kathy Payne and Judy Heffernan and was established in March 2021 from concern for the safety and support available to women in children. The group has actively lobbied at state and federal levels for the Southern Downs region to have more support services.

These events are just their latest initiative, but Sue Hamlet believes they are important for people from all walks of life.

"We have Vanessa Fowler and now Bob Atkinson – Vanessa is the headliner and I think people are familiar with Alison's story particularly the aspect of coercive control that was used long before violence became a part of the situation," Sue said.

Vanessa has a very powerful story and although the focus isn't so much on the story, WAAT believe she will draw on that experience and how to become an effective bystander and how to intervene."

The topic of coercive control is one hard to miss and has been very much in the news of late.

Sue said coercive control is the act of controlling a situation and doing controlling things even if there is no physical violence or a sense of someone being hurt.

"It's becoming well understood now that coercive control is very dangerous, and it can actual precede fatal events," Sue explained.

"It's going to be criminalised very shortly, it's currently going through the system."

Under the new laws, a person who repeatedly subjects their partner to physical, sexual, psychological, or financial abuse may face imprisonment for up to seven years. The bill was introduced into the Queensland Parliament in late September.

"It is important educate the community about this," Sue said.

"These are not just events for people who work in this field, it is for anybody who is

anybody. Just think about the impact of coercive control. A criminal record for a young person who is involved in coercive control – just imagine what that will do to a career.

"We know that coercive control is very damaging to victims, so we want to make people aware of what it looks like. It is a red flag.

"We are very fortunate that Vanessa is going to be joined by Bob Atkinson who is quite well-known. He was a Queensland Police Commissioner. We feel its very relatable for people to hear from someone from a legal perspective as well. It is very important, and we have a Q&A panel as well that will include Bob and Vanessa as well as Kathleen Turley who is the head of the Domestic Violence Action Centre. We will also have police representatives there too. People can bring their questions about anything to do with this sort of thing and we can put it to the panel."

WAAT are also on the panel and facilitating the event.

Sue said WAAT are part of a team of people who form a working party to address family and domestic violence across the Southern Downs.

"One of the things that has come up through that team is that we really want to shift – yes, we have some systems in place for victims and perpetrators. We have a bit more knowledge of what's going on in the

space and that is an ongoing work, but we all feel we want to be more proactive about prevention."

She said the events are all about prevention, knowing what coercive behaviour could look like, knowing what you can do.

"We feel it's going to be extremely important for employers to know, anyone who is part of a group – a service group – any type of group at all that might observe behaviours in themselves and others," Sue explained.

She said the events are suitable for everyone over 14 years of age.

"We are particularly keen for schools, sporting groups, businesses, and young people to hear from Vanessa, as we consider her message to be essential awareness raising in reducing violence to women and children."

"We hope that the schedule provides enough options so that everyone could attend one of the four stand-alone sessions."

Vanessa has been a guiding force in the formation of the Allison Baden-Clay Foundation and is instrumental in coordinating the annual Strive To Be Kind Day in schools, businesses, and community groups where she encourages others to share messages of kindness and respect.

Vanessa and her family are on a journey to educate and raise awareness of domestic and family abuse and has turned a tragic family circumstance into making a difference in the community. The Foundation educates people to recognise the signs of domestic and family abuse and coercive control, and how to become an effective bystander, using tactics to intervene effectively. Vanessa was named as the 2019 Ipswich Citizen of the Year and the Queensland Winner of the Pride of Australia Medal. In 2021, was awarded a Medal of the Order of Australia for her service to community organisations.

Bob Atkinson was the Queensland Police Commissioner from 2000 to late 2012. Bob's achievements include overseeing responses to Cyclone Larry in 2006 and the 2010–11 Queensland flood and cyclone disasters, reductions in crime and the road toll, enforcing welfare support, advocating for multiculturalism, and increasing Police Liaison Officer positions, including the first Sudanese and Muslim positions. In 2013, he was appointed as one of six Commissioners for the five-year Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse.


