


# Stanthorpe has the Christmas spirit

It may only be early December, but the Stanthorpe and Granite Belt Chamber of Commerce is already caught up in Christmas spirit.

Chamber president Graham Parker said they were bringing the town together to shop, meet up and enjoy the season.

"We have been doing a Christmas market or promotion for quite a few years and the intent is to try and get people to shop locally, spend their money in town with the retailers we have here," he said.

"We have more than our fair share of amazing people (and retailers)."

And they have had a head start on the Christmas spirit.

"We basically start from the first week in November and at the end of every week we have a draw," Graham said.

"So, people who go and buy items from one of the retailers in town or even the shops out of town from Wallangarra to Dalveen. If you've got a receipt from a shop, you can come and put it into one of the many entry boxes we've got dotted throughout the main street of town. Write your phone number and your name on the back of it and we draw that every Friday. Each week it's some "Why Leave Town" gift cards and as we get closer to Christmas the amount goes up."

And as in previous years it will all culminate in a free Magical Community Christmas Market on Thursday 21 December from 4pm on the Stanthorpe CBD Footpath.

"In the week leading up to it we're doing Santa photos as well," Graham explained.

"Those Santa photos can be booked through Gracious Giving in town. We have the Santa photos and then there are a whole series of events for the market day. There will be lots of market stalls and this year we are doing a sort of a treasure hunt."

"We have a whole pile of different items that will be in shop windows and the kids will have to go and find all those items. Whatever the item is that is listed they must find it and write what shop it is in. We've got that and we're going to have badge making – little button badges for the kids and there's face painting."

The whole thing will culminate in a laser light show.

"The market day on the twenty first

basically becomes the finale of the Christmas events for November-December," he said.

The event will include a chance to vote for your favourite decorated shop, decorated hat competitions, roving entertainment, live music, more than 40 market stalls, the Farmer's Doughnuts, the ever-popular Rotary ham wheel, a chance to get your Lions Christmas cakes, a sausage sizzle, She Hive Ladies Hot Dog Stall and the laser light show.

There will also be a giving tree this year.

"For the people who are members of the Chamber we've given them the opportunity to invoice the chamber for \$50 and to provide us with an item we can use as a prize or we will be gifting those items to needy families," Graham said.

"That's what Stanthorpe is about. It's about everybody chipping in and doing that little bit. If we all do that little bit and we get very good outcomes. The breadth of businesses around here never ceases to amaze me."

The Christmas event is just one of a

number of things the Chamber has been doing this year.

Graham said the chamber was going well and had new members on the executive.

"Our chamber over the past few years has been very, very focused on bringing Emu Swamp

Dam and that's been a very big priority for several years but now that's out of our hands and back in the hands of the Government we will let them do their thing and we will go back to focussing on what we as a chamber need to do," he said.

"And it's not just events like this, last year we put on a series of workshops which were very very well received so we are planning on doing some more of those in the same vein in the new year. Again, it's all of those things. We spent a long time and a chunk of money revisiting the Chamber's strategic plan a couple of years ago and that gave us a good focus and direction on what our membership wanted and again that's what we are focussing on this year. And we are

getting back into the pre-covid networking meetings.

"We used to have regular networking meetings, but when Covid came that got knocked on the head.

"It's about getting back into the swing of those things and then organising interesting speakers."

He said in his time with the chamber he had tried to prioritize working together as a community.

"We actually do a thing with the council every three months called the Granite Belt Alliance," Graham said.

"It's a working group between the Chamber of Commerce, Granite Belt Wine and Tourism, representation from the festivals, the sports association, one of the environmental groups, the arts group. There are quite a few of us, we get together every three months and discuss what each group is doing and then the council update us on what they're doing. We try and find where we've got commonality of objectives so we can better together."

He said from a chamber perspective it was all about the broader community not just their members.

"That's what I'm passionate about – it doesn't just have to be our members, we are here for the broader business community as well, whether they are chamber members or not," Graham said.

He said the Christmas Markets were a chance for the whole community to get together and have fun.



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# Christmas markets to enjoy

Handmade Christmas decorations, chooks, men's beard-care hampers, fruit, vegies, handcrafted jewellery and one-of-a-kind ladies clothing pieces – it's time for the Combined Christmas Market.

Once a year Market in the Mountains and Stanthorpe Showgrounds Markets organisers team up to hold their 'Combined Christmas Market' – this time it's on Sunday 10 December from 8am-noon at the Stanthorpe Showgrounds, 8 High Street Stanthorpe. Parking is off the street around the showgrounds

"We currently have 80 stalls booked, with tables inside and marquees around the exhibition hall," Market in the Mountains organiser/secretary Kasia Tatar explained.

"I think this is the third one – we've been doing it for three years."

"We have a market at the showgrounds, the market on the mountains is on the second Sunday of the month and the showground market is in the same place on the fourth Sunday of the month."

"One of them is a handmade market – our only requirement for stallholders is that they have to make what they sell. We are trying to support local makers and people who might have a farm but need a second income at certain times of the year so they make things – because people are pretty crafty."

"The Showgrounds market is on the fourth Sunday and it's a general market, so if you have things you want to sell, whether you make them or not this is the market for you. If you're starting a commercial business or you're selling second-hand goods or reconditioned furniture you can come to the showgrounds on the fourth Sunday."

The two market groups decided that

one big market for Christmas providing something for everybody on the one day was the way to go but it also serves as a bit of a get together for the two groups too.

"We really, really, really enjoy it because all the people on the second Sunday get to see all the people on the fourth Sunday, it's really awesome," Kasia, a jewellery maker, enthused.

"Because if you're a little bit crafty and you make what you sell, you're always looking for interesting finds. So, the showground markets is really a treasure market half the time (for the artisans too). We really do enjoy this combined market."

And as well as pretty diverse shopping opportunities, there is plenty to eat, drink and enjoy.

"The cafe is open, it's not usually open at our market and we've got a sausage sizzle run by a local community group that does a fundraiser," she said.

"For this one it's the men's shed. It's a lot of fun."

She said people are often surprised when they come along to the Christmas markets.

"Market in the Mountains is usually quite small, we only have about 40 stalls."

"For this one we're hoping to have 100 stalls. We have 80 at the moment but we expect more. For this one anyone can book a stall, you don't have to be local – we get quite a lot of interest in the two weeks coming up to the market. I think we're getting a reputation that it's interesting and fun and quite a lot of people go."

"We have a huge variety of things, I think that's what most people find particularly surprising."

"We have all the traditional handmade things, we have the best selection of crocheted tea-towels in the world. You will definitely find one to go with any decor in your house, but we also have welded garden ornaments, plant holders with got a huge variety of plant whether your looking for orchids or dahlias – I think the people who sell dahlia tubers have over a hundred types of tubers. Everything – actual sheepskin, honey packs, beard packs - beautiful things."

### Festive food safety

Festive food safety is especially important during the holiday season when preparing and serving food to family and friends.

Food poisoning could ruin celebrations and put guests at risk, so it is essential to follow some simple tips to keep food safe and delicious.

### Plan ahead

Start talking with friends and family now about who is preparing what food. Plan to cook riskier foods like meat and turkey at the location of the Christmas dinner and use a meat thermometer to make sure it is cooked to 75°C in the thickest part of the meat.

Ask guests who are travelling more than an hour to bring foods which don't require cooking or refrigeration make sure there is enough fridge and freezer space on the day.

### A ham is for Christmas, not for life.

The ham will keep several weeks with proper handling. After reading the packaging labels, remove the plastic wrap, cover it with clean cloth soaked in water and vinegar and store it in the fridge below 5°C.

### Plucked ducks don't need baths

Washing any raw poultry is unsafe as it can spread bacteria to hands, surfaces and other uncooked foods.

Washing is also unnecessary as cooking poultry to 75°C in the centre or the thickest part will kill any bacteria.

### Love your leftovers

Don't leave leftovers unrefrigerated. Eat within 3 days and make sure your fridge is running at 5°C or below. If freezing, write the freezing date on the container and always reheat leftovers to 75°C in the centre to kill any bacteria.

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# Keeping inclusivity in sight

Lauren Killen is losing her sight, but what she is gaining along the way is a fierce determination to ensure inclusive sports and recreational activities exist for people with disability in regional areas. The 38-year-old has played and volunteered in multiple codes of sport, including netball and tennis. She has also been a pony club instructor and judge for many years and used to compete as an equestrian rider.

This year Lauren has started playing Blind Tennis with Tennis Australia and completed a level one sports trainer course to do first aid for the junior rugby league club that her sons play at.

Taking after their mother, Lauren's three children all play sport at representative level.

They also have retinitis pigmentosa, the degenerative eye disease she, her father and her grandmother have. It's the love and devotion Lauren has for Alivia, Mark and Logan that's fuelling her desire to drive inclusive change in and around Warwick, a small country town in the Southern Downs Region.

"I am extremely passionate about making sure there are sport and recreation activities for people with disabilities in rural and regional areas," Lauren said.

"My wish is to become a role model and voice for people with disability in my community to help them overcome any challenges or barriers they face when trying to take part in sport.

"I also want to make sure children with disability are given opportunities to take part in sports and recreational activities that they love, not just those that are accessible to them."

Lauren, who is legally blind, was last year supported to access the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) through Carers Queensland, the state's largest NDIS Partner in the Community.

The NDIS funds support workers for Lauren to help with cleaning, cooking and other essential daily tasks, with the mother saying the assistance is "absolutely fantastic."

Lauren also has an occupational therapist helping to maintain her independence for as long as possible.

"I think when you've got retinitis pigmentosa you don't realise how much you rely on feeling and how bad my sight actually is," Lauren said.

"I make such a mess in the kitchen, it's like a bomb has gone off after I've done some cooking, and prior to NDIS supports I did have a few accidents."

After her marriage ended about five years ago, Lauren worked three jobs to take care of her children, quietly battling away as a single parent.

Because she had been so independent and self-sufficient for so long, Lauren said it was hard to accept NDIS help, particularly having someone come into the family home.

"Learning to accept help wasn't easy at first and having a stranger in the house was weird for the kids to start with but now they're getting used to it and it's definitely helping our family," she said.

A few years ago Lauren got a job at an optometrist, which she loved until her own vision problems deteriorated and conversations she was having with older people on the verge of losing their licences became triggering for her.

Lauren now works full time at non-profit Best Employment in Warwick where she uses her life experience as a person with disability to help clients develop their skills and confidence to seek out employment opportunities. Because Lauren is no longer legally allowed to drive, Lauren uses her NDIS supports to access a support worker and uses taxis so she can travel at night to watch her children compete.

To keep her own mental and physical health in check, Lauren stays active, running a carefully mapped out course and going for the occasional horse ride.

Growing up with poor vision meant wearing thick glasses and Lauren says she was an easy target for bullies in her small rural town of Inglewood.

"It was an absolute nightmare, and horse riding was the first thing that I was good at and it was my life," she said.

"I've actually just started riding again and I'm hope to one day get back into competitions. What I'd really love is to eventually make it to the Paralympics."

Lauren admits getting back on the saddle isn't as easy now her vision has deteriorated but says she's at her "absolute happiest" on

a horse.

"When I'm on my horse I don't feel blind because I'm so busy thinking about what this horse is doing and how I'm going to do this and do that, thinking back to all the skills that I've learned over my lifetime," she said.

Lauren believes staying active is incredibly important for people with disability, saying for her it keeps her anxiety at bay.

"Providing sport and recreational opportunities for people with disability should not be an afterthought. I feel like it's as important as homecare and should not be seen as a luxury," she said. It's Lauren's passion for creating change that saw her jump at the chance to work with Carers Queensland on its Inclusive Sports and Recreation project as a member of the organisation's Beyond the Sidelines Reference Group.

As one of Australia's largest NDIS Partners in the Community, Carers Queensland has a key role to play in driving inclusive change in communities.

Its Sport and Rec project aims to increase the representation and participation of people with disability in sport and

recreation, both on and off the playing field, in the lead up to the Brisbane 2032 Olympic and Paralympic Games. Lauren is one of eight people with disability who will be instrumental in helping the organisation to identify best practices in sport and recreation for people with disability and help remove barriers.

"When I was losing my sight I was told 'you can't do this; you can't do that' and it was just so frustrating," she said.

"So now it's my mission to try and help people like me to access sports that make them happy because there's nothing like it," she said.

"And it's not just about team sports, I want to help people with disability pursue individual recreational activities like fishing, I love fishing but these days I can't just hop in the car and go."

"I feel like we also definitely need to have a conversation about local sport in rural areas being more inclusive."

"The same goes for people with disability volunteering, I think there should be an avenue for those who want to get involved on the sidelines." Lauren said there was an all-abilities touch team in Toowoomba but for many people with disability, including herself, it was out of reach to get there. She said in areas such as Inglewood, Warwick and Goondiwindi there were few sporting opportunities for people with disability.

"We need to make it so people can just go to their local sports club and have a go in some way," she said.

"This is particularly important in kid's sport in rural areas where numbers are dropping dramatically, with areas such as Texas and Millmerran not having enough players to make up a rugby league team." Lauren says she is feeling optimistic and positive about the future and wants to harness her resilience and strength to help people in regional and rural areas who live with disability.

"You just keep going, don't you. I just want to get better and better and use what I've been through to help inspire other people," she said.

"I've heard others speak and it's motivated me to be a person who inspires and encourage others to live life to the fullest regardless of what life throws at them."


