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

Getting ready for showtime

The clock is being turned back to the age of the dinosaur at this year's Stanthorpe show to be held from 2-4 February.

Christmas and New Years are just behind us and the work is on in earnest for one of the next big Southern Downs and Granite Belt events – the Stanthorpe Agricultural Show.

And show society president Brett Boatfield said while all the things that make the show – well – the show will be back, there will be plenty of new attractions too.

"Preparation is well underway," the man they call Boaty admitted.

"We've been preparing for a couple of months now and this year we've got some exciting entertainment attractions coming that we haven't had at the show before."

"I can't say too much but we've got some dinosaurs coming, we've got a climbing wall, we've got some stunt cars coming and we've also got the return of a really really popular event that we had years ago – that's the jumping dogs."

What are jumping dogs - well according to Boaty it's like high jump for dogs (with prizes).

"They put up the wall and the dogs jump up and over it," he said.

"As they clear a height they put up another board and make it higher. The dogs jump over the wall until there is finally a winner."

"Any one can enter that thinks their dog

will jump the highest, we've got two ladies coming down from the Sunshine Coast, they've got kelpies. They are coming down to run it and show everyone how it's done for a start and then run the competition.

"So we're encouraging all local dog owners to get their dogs in training now because there will be prizes, sponsored by local businesses, for the winner and you'll also have the very esteemed privilege of having the highest jumping dog in the district.

"It's all pretty cool.

"We used to do it years ago and Gail and Sarah of Coastal Kelpies are bringing it back, I can't wait, it's going to be awesome."

"We do have the novelty dogs event on the Saturday already and we have lots of categories from cutest to ugliest, every one can go to that," he said.

"And that will be followed by the jumping dogs at 4pm on the Saturday afternoon. It's dogs, dogs, dogs."

The dog jump will be sponsored by The Discovery Truffle Centre, one of the many local businesses who pitch in and support the show each year. There will be social media posts but it will be a case of nominating on the day.

"It is fantastic the amount of support we get from the local community and we have to because that's how we survive, the show survives on its sponsorship," he said.

"We are always looking for sponsors definitely, if anyone wants to come forward

and sponsor a section or an event or what ever it might be, then come along.

"We have our major naming rights sponsor which is Bendigo Bank again this year while Spano's IGA sponsor the night-time entertainment."

And there are pretty cool night-time events this time around.

"We have the Stunt Cars and we will certainly have a fantastic fireworks display as we always do."

While Stanthorpe is always the first show in Qld and often the benchmark event – this year – like last year – they are the second show in Australia with NSW show society members and near neighbours Tenterfield actually holds its show just before.

"But it doesn't worry us because people still come along and have a great time," Boaty said.

"Though this year we are really encouraging membership. We have a lot of further benefits for membership because not only do you get into all of the other shows around the area (and think there's five shows) you also get free parking on ground. If you're not a member it's \$5 but it's free for both days if you're a member."

"We also have an early bird special, if you get your membership in by 12 January where we will draw a membership number out of the hat and they will get a great prize which will include food vouchers and ride vouchers from the Showman's Guild."

"We will have discount tickets for members to go to the two rodeos that we hold at this showground every year."

Boaty and his team hope that all the added attractions and benefits will encourage everyone to come along and enjoy the show – one of the big and important events on the Granite Belt Calendar, a chance to get together and catch with old friends. It is an event that shows off the talents and produce of the region.

"We set the standard for the show season, a lot of show societies are envious of what we can do and how we do it because we are so diverse," he said.

"But every show society has its own niche and its own things they have as an attraction. We just have a great diversity of things for people to see and do and everyone comes along and supports it and enjoys it."

"And that's what it's all about – just enjoying it."

The membership fees remain the same as last year being \$20 for a single and \$40 for a couple or family. Make holiday time fitness time

With so many of us making New Years resolutions to get fit and healthy, start a new exercise regime or take up a new sport it's no wonder Warwick Indoor Recreation and Aquatic Centre (Wirac) is gearing up for another busy year in 2024.

The centre, run by the YMCA, is one of those heart of the community places, where you can join in a sport on the outside courts, learn to swim, go to the gym and even take up water aerobics.

So, it's little wonder YMCA Assistant Manager Aquatics, Donna Luttrell said the centre expected another busy year.

"There are new fitness programs coming in – it's fabulous and there will be a range of activities for the young and old," she said.

"We offer a wide range of services, we have a gym and we have Personal Trainers – Ann, Vivian and Sam. Sam is our new one starting next year. In the water, we have all of our aqua classes – aqua gentles run in the morning in our hydro pool. In the afternoon we have different aqua fit programs."

She said they were also starting up a new Boga Fit class of an afternoon again this year. So what is Boga Fit?

"It's kind of an aqua class on blow up mats," she said.

"It's like a blow up lilo and you stand on that and do your aqua class. It's called Boga (Yoga with a b) Fit classes. We have run them previously, it is usually just a summer thing so when we open up in January. It usually runs for the first term of the year basically."

"They are something a little bit different that a lot of people enjoy that. It's very hard to balance but really builds up that core."

"As well as the Boga we just brought in our Pilate Re-former classes. That's been a new thing we've been trialling."

Donna said the reformer classes were small, up to about eight people working on a circuit program.

"And we have many other fitness classes that we offer as well that will all be coming back," she said.

Wirac also play host to a number of other sporting bodies which hire out the facilities there.

"We have netball and basketball who come and use our courts and we run Futsal here now too," Donna explained.

"We have a lot of people who hire the

courts to run their programs on. That way the courts are used quite a lot.

"Futsal has just started up and the organiser is trying to get it up and running. It's a competition that is definitely going to be here this year, he is really starting to build it up."

Futsal is a type of indoor soccer and with interest in soccer at an all-time high in Australia thanks to the success of the Matildas it is hoped that there will be plenty of interest in the new competition.

And while there are plenty of sports outside, Wirac is well-known for its learn to swim classes, something that Donna is particularly passionate about.

"We will continue to have our learn to swim classes again this year, offering courses for babies up to adults," she said.

"We are actually adding new adult learn to swim classes this year."

"At the moment we will be running them on Saturday mornings, we have an early morning one coming at the moment. I'm not sure about the other days yet but there is definitely a Saturday morning one."

"We start our learn to swim back on 22 January and that will run all year round up until the end of the school year December."

But before the regular learn to swim

program the Wirac will run their annual swim intensives weeks during this month, running Monday to Friday from 8 January (\$70) to 12 January. Week two of the program will run from 15 January to 19 January. Just contact Wirac for more information. These courses are generally from school-age up.

"And just for fun we will also have our inflatables running on Tuesday and Thursdays," Donna said.

"Kids can come to the pool Tuesdays and Thursdays between 10am-12 during the second week of January. Obviously we've got the kids learn to swim pool, the rapid river pool where they can come and enjoy floating around. We have all the pools ready to go for the holidays and of course lifeguards area always on duty."

"Lifeguarding is a tough gig," Donna said from experience, although not part of the regular lifeguard roster she helps out when needed. She admits its a tough job - though vital - and urged pool goers to abide by the rules and be respectful of the tough job the life guards have to do.

"It really is a hard thing to do, it can be quite boring. You've got to be very focused but because you're standing there watching all day there is a tendency to zone out - that makes it very hard because you can't do that

you've got to almost have eyes in the back of your head. It's a serious job you've got people's lives in your hands, you're not there as babysitters you're there to do that job and to stop incidents from happening. You have to be firm and tough so you aren't put in a situation where you are doing rescues. People are like "you're always yelling at me and stopping from doing this" but that's part of the job. That's what they are there for, to stop those incidents. Lifeguards have it tough and it's hot and tiring so please understand and respect them, follow the rules and keep everyone safe."

Wirac also has a well-equipped gym for those looking to work out.

"We've got a couple of new machines we have a booty buster that has just gone in," she said.

"So yeah we have the gym, we have fitness classes, we have the new Boga one coming."

As well as all the their regular programs Wirac is heavily involved and supportive of the community holding events and fundraisers through the year - the most recent one for Protea Place.

Donna said there really was something to suit all needs from the hydro therapy pool to Futsal.



Castle of Tarragindi comes to town

Looking for a school holiday treat? The Stanthorpe Regional Art Gallery, currently domiciled in the Civic Centre in Marsh Street might have just the thing.

Children and families can take part in a free range of fun art-making activities by contemporary Australian artist Natalya Hughes when 'The Castle of Tarragindi on Tour' comes to the gallery in the Civic Centre, Marsh Street, on 18 January 10am -11.30 am.

Developed in collaboration with the Queensland Art Gallery|Gallery of Modern Art (QAGOMA), 'The Castle of Tarragindi on Tour' invites audiences to create their own digital hybrid creature, decorate and assemble a 3D object, make elaborate patterns using printed paper, and take part in self-portrait drawing activities.

Hughes creates paintings, textiles, sculptures and installations informed by

decorative and ornamental traditions. In 'The Castle of Tarragindi', the artist has chosen to explore 'grotesque' design, a specific tradition of ornament known for its hybridity.

'The Castle of Tarragindi on Tour' features a striking blue and white palette inspired by a grotesque castle interior by French designer, architect, and engraver Jean Berain (1640–1711).

Hughes has also included imagery of things that are important to her in the activity materials – such as the Australian flora and fauna found close to her home in the Brisbane suburb of Tarragindi.

As part of the project, children will be able to view an introductory video where Hughes shares her thoughts on the inspiration and concepts behind 'The Castle of Tarragindi'.

Queensland Art Gallery/Gallery of

Modern Art Director Chris Saines said the free program would be presented at more than 200 regional and remote venues across all 77 Queensland and Torres Strait Councils areas including 17 First Nation Councils from January through to June 2024.

'The regional tour of the program from Boigu Island to Birdsville and Millaroo to Middlemount occurs as 'Natalya Hughes: The Castle of Tarragindi' continues at the Children's Art Centre at the Gallery of Modern Art, Brisbane until 14 July 2024,' Mr Saines said.

Natalya Hughes (b.1971) completed a Bachelor of Visual Arts at the Queensland University of Technology, Brisbane in 2001 and a PhD in Art Theory at the College of Fine Art (UNSW) in 2009. She currently lectures in Fine Art and Expanded Practice at the Queensland College of Art, Brisbane.

Hughes has exhibited her work at

numerous museums and institutions including Queensland Art Gallery/Gallery of Modern Art (2019, 2017 and 2012), QUT Art Museum Brisbane (2016), Artspace Sydney (2016), Hazelhurst Regional Gallery (2015), Performance Space (2012), Parliament House Canberra (2014), UQ Art Museum, Brisbane (2010), Ian Potter Museum of Art, Melbourne (2009) and Tarrawarra Museum of Art, VIC (2006).

Hughes was a finalist in both the Sulman Prize at Art Gallery of NSW and the National Works on Paper Prize at Mornington Peninsula Regional Gallery in 2018, as well as the 2017 Ramsay Art Prize at Art Gallery of South Australia.

deliver a new modern facility that contributes to the greater liveability of the Southern Downs by catering for the


arts, culture and learning needs of our community," the spokesperson said.

"Not only will this expansion further enhance the services on offer but also provide the library's \$1m collection of



books with a better home and provide the art gallery's circa \$2.5m art collection with a storage solution that

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Helping to change attitudes

Early next month the co-chairs of the Domestic and Family Violence Prevention council Vanessa Fowler and Bob Atkinson will head to Warwick and Stanthorpe a keynote speaker at a series of events around the district.

The duo will discuss and be involved in Q&As about coercive behaviour, what it is and the new laws that will come into force in Queensland across several events including a breakfast in Warwick. The events are being rescheduled after fires caused their postponed in November.

They are now being organised for 13-15 February.

Domestic and Family Violence Prevention and coercive control are subjects close both to Bob and Vanessa's hearts - Bob as a former Queensland police commissioner and Vanessa whose sister Allison Baden-Clay was killed by her husband in April 2012.

The pair said they were trying talk to as many communities across the State possible and get the message out about domestic and family violence.

Vanessa said the council has been tasked with working closely with local government council areas and had been contacted by the Southern Downs Regional Council.

"One of the managers of the Integrated Service Response Team, Trudy Peters, approached us and asked if we would come out and speak to the Southern Downs Regional area," Vanessa said.

"So, during our visit we'll have a meeting with the Southern Downs Regional Council and we will also be able to talk to some of the students in some of the schools out there."

She said talking to young people was an important part of what the group was doing.

Vanessa said they were particularly keen to work with young people who might be at risk of being disengaged with school.

"At the moment we have a couple of events set where we will be able to hear not only from our front-line services that work in the area but also the community outlet groups that are interested in our work," she said.

"We know we have a business breakfast set up too. So, we are going to be talking to owners of small businesses, medium-sized businesses and those that are interested in being educated around coercive control."

"All our work is focussed on educating and preventing domestic and family violence and educating people more broadly in the signs of coercive control."

"Our aim is to do that with both the young people in the area as well as business and community groups."

So how important is it to get this message out to rural communities and start the discussion on what coercive control is and how to spot it.

"I think it's extremely important to educate and bring awareness and educate around coercive control," Vanessa said.

"I know when my sister was murdered eleven years ago, we had no language around what it was. "For us as a family, we were looking for the physical signs because we thought that domestic and family violence was physical. We were looking for the black eyes and the broken bones and the bruises and there were none. But my sister Alison's abuse happened behind closed

doors and so it was hidden, and it was an ugly conversation that nobody wanted to have. It was swept under the carpet.

"After many years of highlighting the conversation around domestic abuse that we are finally now, with the Government bringing in this legislation around coercive control, its only now that we've put a label on it, and it's now known as coercive control. Our foundation and many other not for profits in the community are now educating the community around the signs."

"It is really important that not only victims themselves - those going through domestic violence, but also the family and friends, the bystanders, are also very well aware of what is going on. It takes many many forms so it's important that people recognise the different forms."

What should we be looking for?

"I suppose one that is very prevalent today is technological abuse because each and everyone of us holds a phone in our hand so it's a very easy tool and mechanism for perpetrators to use," she said.

"Tracking devices, monitoring bank accounts and knowing where a victim moves, where they go, who they see, who they talk to."

"And of course, with young people, there is also pornography and all of those social media influences that are very prevalent in their lives."

"Another one would be financial abuse; they are monitoring bank accounts and restricting access to financial funds. There is also emotional abuse, intimidation, threats. There are various forms and we as a prevention council use the power of control wheel to highlight this. We will be bringing some of those out with us on our trip. It actually highlights all the different ways that we can see and recognise coercive control."

Who are they hoping will come out to the events?

"As many people as possible," Bob added.

"One of the things about domestic and family violence is that they say, quite rightly, that it has no postcode, there is no specific area of society where it exists separate from others."

"Vanessa mentioned young people and it is just so important. One of our great concerns is the access by boys and young men to violent pornography and the messaging that goes with it that this is the way you treat women."

He said they were also hoping to see a lot of people from local government.

"Probably, and this is no disrespect meant to State or Federal Government politicians because their electorates are much larger, local government is generally very much in touch with their own communities," Bob explained.

"What we're looking for here as well

is leadership from everyone - sporting organisations, local government, businesses, clubs and can I compliment Zonta - they are a fine organisation who have worked hard in this space.

"To get the sort of change we need, what we need to do is change the attitudes, values, beliefs that lead to the behaviours of people who commit domestic violence. That is not something that can happen overnight, but it can happen, and we believe there is a very strong momentum for change now. Wherever we go we are sensing that."

The events are being presented by the Women's Action and Advocacy Team Southern Downs (WAAT) in collaboration with the State Department of Women's Safety and Violence Prevention, Warwick and Stanthorpe Zonta Clubs, Warwick Chamber of Commerce and SDRC to bring these important DFV Community Education sessions to the community.
