Louise steps up for Artworks

It's been a big couple of months for Granite Belt artist Louise Samuel, not only has she just taken over from Mary Rofe as the marketing officer for Artworks, but she has also just opened her latest exhibition too.

Louise and her husband Colin Sellers came to the Granite Belt in 2003 with the intention of setting up a gallery alongside a cellar door. Col would do the winemaking and Louise would be painting for herself, rather than for the Commercial Art Industry; she has a degree in Graphic Design (UK) and worked as a Graphic Designer, mostly in her own business, for 20 years in Africa, the UK and Australia.

The wine was excellent, Louise sold paintings and all was good until Col was diagnosed with inoperable, terminal cancer. Col died in 2008 and Louise decided to hold onto her husband's dream so became the true 'Accidental Winemaker' for the next seven years.

Since selling the vineyard and winery Louise has been gradually getting back to painting but does get diverted by the maintenance of her property, not only the house but the 40 acres which is a registered Nature Refuge.

Louise travels to Europe twice a year, mainly to see her mother in the UK who is still an influence on her artwork today. Thanks to her artist mother she could draw before she could read and the exhibition, 'No Longer Accidental', includes her first oil painting at age four (not for sale).

The title of the exhibition reflects her move from using the term 'the accidental

'winemaker' to her return to being a professional artist, which is definitely not an accidental move.

Living on the property in Whiskey Gully has intensified her interest in conservation and this is reflected in much of her subject matter. Although Louise does use ink (lots

of sketchbooks from her travels) and acrylic, her current preferred media is watercolor, but not in the traditional 'pretty landscape' style, her paintings are strong and striking.

Alongside the 'No Longer Accidental', which runs from 20 June to 24 August, the Cafe Gallery at Artworks will be showing a

selection of member's artworks and craft. The Artworks galleries are located in the Stanthorpe Railway Station, accessed from Davadi Street.

There is a painting on show that is not for sale. It is a little oil painting of a teddy, Peddles, done by Louise at aged four. Louise could draw well before she could read and loved painting alongside her talented mother.

Her mother, now 96, is still an important part of Louise's creative life and she sees, and critiques, Louise's work everyday (via email).

It is because of her mother that Louise travels back to Europe twice a year, she is an important lady and any time spent with her is precious (and yes she still paints and runs an art class!).

Textile art takes centre stage

Warwick Art Gallery is proud to present four powerful, contemporary textile art exhibitions for the 2025 Jumpers and Jazz in July festival, showcasing the rich diversity, ingenuity, and social commentary embedded in the medium of fibre art today.

Each exhibition reflects a different facet of textile innovation, from deeply personal storytelling to global environmental issues and artistic reinvention of traditional crafts.

Oh MG is a deeply moving exhibition created by Chloe Wigg, an artist living with Myasthenia Gravis (MG), a rare and debilitating neuromuscular disease. This thoughtful body of work uses textile art as a tool for advocacy, awareness, and healing.

Featuring multi-layered portraits, a large-scale crocheted snowflake wall-hanging, and snowflake sculptures made from upcycled medication bottles, the exhibition speaks to the fragility of life, the uniqueness of each individual's experience with MG, and the challenges of living with a heat-sensitive condition in Queensland's climate.

Each crocheted snowflake has been donated by others living with MG and their supporters from across Australia, turning personal hardship into collective strength and beauty.

Also featured is Dangles by internationally celebrated fibre artist Prudence Mapstone, renowned for pioneering the technique of freeform crochet.

Mapstone's new installation suspends hundreds of vibrant, mixed-media textile works from the ceiling, enveloping viewers in a world of playful shapes, colours, and textures.

With an approach that embraces spontaneity and rejects uniformity, her works challenge perceptions of craft and are admired around the globe for their organic beauty and innovative construction.

Yarnbombed Tree exhibition. This year's entries fall under either the Open Theme or the intriguing new Cascade Theme, encouraging artists to experiment with flowing designs that embrace gravity and movement.

The definition of cascade is open to interpretation and the unexpected way that artists decode the new theme every year is one of the reasons visitors have been returning to the festival year after year.

Together, these four exhibitions affirm Warwick Art Gallery's vital role in promoting contemporary and cutting-edge textile art during Jumpers and Jazz in July, a festival known for celebrating creativity in all its forms. As the streets of Warwick come alive with yarnbombed trees and winter revelry, the Gallery offers visitors an immersive experience that blends artistic excellence with powerful social commentary and community engagement.

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The art of St Mark's

For one weekend a year for the past 13 years, St Mark's Anglican Church hall has become one of the focal points of art and yarnbombing during the annual Jumpers and Jazz in July in Warwick.

The 1886 heritage Church's famous Flower Tower makes it one of the most photographed buildings in Warwick during the festival while inside the hall is another of the festival's highlights – Art@St Marks – a weekend of art and artists.

Always held the first weekend – this time around 18-20 July – the event allows artists local regional and beyond to display and sell their paintings.

"Art@st.mark's continues to be held only during the first weekend due to the demand for the Parish Hall by other users and the availability of our hard-working volunteers so ably led now by Sharon Johnson, long-time organiser, supporter and publicity officer of the event Sue Nalder said.

"The event has become the number one fund raising event in the Parish – all down of course to the wonderful and generous volunteers without whom, none of this could happen.

"The Flower Tower will provide a spectacular focus in the town once

again. The huge number of visitors to it throughout JJJ has encouraged the Parish to keep the 1868 heritage Church open for viewing throughout the whole JJJ this year."

Sue said the event continued to attract artists of diverse experience, working in different mediums.

"Last year we had 211 pieces listed for entry and that was from 79 different artists," she said.

"We actually sold 59 pieces, representing 38 artists. I haven't done the maths but I guess a quarter. So for art in what are a little bit more constrained economic conditions, that's still a pretty good turn over.

"We get such a range – there is something for everyone. A piece can be priced at \$50 and can sell or we had one piece was more in the thousands and that sold too. It really just depends on who comes and how they appeal. Art is so subjective, what appeals to you or what I want to put on my wall is so completely different and that's why I think it's such a wonderful thing that we continue to do this as a community outreach. In fact we were approached by the news site of the Anglican Church in Southern Queensland to actually produce a "top tips" for running a Parish art exhibition


which they've just published in the most recent edition of the Anglican Focus.

"We did put together a big manual back in the early 2000s, my husband and I, when we were first doing the event to try to give everybody a timeline which is so important to make this happen. Now that Sharon Johnson has taken over the overall coordination of the event, she's found following the processes to be invaluable because hopefully this way you don't miss an important step in the whole process because there's a lot of work that goes on behind the scenes that most people are completely unaware of.

"So many of our artists always say how much they look forward to participating in Art@St Marks because it all seems to run so smoothly for them and they feel that their work is displayed to show off their talent and to show the effort that they have made."

Art@St Marks will launch on Friday, 18 July at 6pm with guest artist Debbie Diekmann, finger food and live music by Melomaniacs - \$20 at the door – includes a complimentary beverage.

The event itself is free and starts at 9.30am on Friday morning going through to 3.30pm that day, 9.30am to 4pm on Saturday or 9.30am to 2.30pm on Sunday.



FOCUS ON MODEL AIRCRAFT



Come fly with me

Former meteorologist Jeffery Linton has always loved aeroplanes – both real and model – so much so that even now in retirement, you can still find him with his mates flying models at the Warwick Aero Modellers club a couple of times a week.

This month, on top of their regular days flying, Jeffery, WAM president Greg Barclay and a lot of their members will be taking part in the Festival of Aeromodelling at Inglewood Airport from 5-13 July.

Now in its fourth year, the festival is one of the largest of its kind in Australia, bringing together more than 200 pilots and operating four active flight lines across nine days of flying. This year they are welcoming international participants from the USA, Mexico, and the UK along with model aviation enthusiasts from across the country.

It's a big deal but it's all part of the fun for the members of WAM.

Jeff said the festival was the brainchild of some “pretty keen aeromodellers back in Brisbane”.

“This is the fourth year of it and it’s just grown from year to year where this year, the last I heard, there was 240 of us going,” he explained.

“We’re all part of a group called the Model Aeronautical Association of Australia and there’s about 10,000 members all over Australia and they all fly what I jokingly call toy aeroplanes but they are radio controlled model aeroplanes worth many thousands of dollars. But it’s good for a laugh saying toy aeroplanes,” he chuckled.

“We have about 25 members here in Warwick, which is pretty good – we have a fabulous field out at Morgan Park. There are patches of all over the country and that’s what this festival at Inglewood is all about – bringing everybody together. They are emulating a very large event in America called the Joe Nal event, which attracts thousands of flyers from all over America, and they all go there for a few days and have one big comraderie, selling things as in trade shows and tutorials. We’re doing the same thing at Inglewood but on a smaller scale. They are bringing everyone they can in from Australia, coming from as far away as Perth and certainly Melbourne, Canberra, Sydney, Newcastle, Port Macquarie – that’s the people I know who are coming. Maitland and parts of Queensland. I don’t know exactly how many of our club are going but there are about half a dozen who are dead-keen.”

So how did he get into flying the planes?
“Funny you should say that, we all started

as kids, well most of us did – flying at the local park with the local hobby shop pushing it. In my case it was the local hobby shop. We had the Oakey Model Air club in Melbourne and flew control lines as kids. We used to ride our bikes to the local park and the club there would be formed. I went on to fly full size for a few years and then when I gave that up I went back to the models that I’d already been with.

“It’s just something that’s fun, a great bunch of blokes and aeroplanes are fun to fly. You get the bigger ones or more skillful ones, you get jets, gliders, helicopters, the whole gamut is there. I fly all of them. I dabble in it all. I just like the whole lot, the whole concept, if there’s a gliding event I’ll go to that, if there’s a helicopter event – I won’t be so keen because they’re very hard to fly but great fun, very skillful. I like my warbird type planes. It keeps male in particularly – happy but that’s a funny word. They are sort of like gigantic men’s sheds if that makes any sense. We get as much fun just blabbing as flying planes – the weather’s not perfect everytime you go so we like to sit around and chew the fat. And of course at home you’re building planes in your garage – it’s a big thing and lots of blokes do it, not everyone’s in the MAAA but we’re in it for insurance and the comraderie is a big part of it. It really is like the Men’s Shed – you know the concept where blokes talk to each other – you’ve got the common thread of course but always diverts off to why are you coughing, what’s wrong with you, go to the bloody doctor you bloody idiot.”

For Jeffery it was that childhood love of planes that led him to his dream job.

“I’m an ex-meteorologist – I not only had

a pilot’s licence and had my own planes, I was also a weather man for 12 years with the weather bureau and worked in most airports in Australia – a lot of the major airports – Melbourne, Sydney, Adelaide, Perth and Port Hedland,” he said.

“That was my interest in the aviation side of things – I was able to line it up with the weather and it was a fabulous combination.

“If you could imagine me parking my full-sized a plane outside the weather bureau’s office at an airport – that was just the most magnificent dream any little boy could have. That was fun for a few years.”

While it is all about the flying for Jeffery and his fellow club members – they are always happy to have others out to watch and to spread their love of model aircraft.

“We get lots of public watching, people just come out and look,” he said.

“We always try and get new members of course and that’s difficult. It’s very hard to get kids because the kids are so roped into their video games and all that. What we’ve found in the past few years though is the 40 year old male whose family is growing up, he’s not getting bored, but he’s got a good job, he’s working, he’s got kids and a house and he wants something to do so he tends to wander down to the club and we grab him and say come and have a fly. We have buddy box systems where two of us can fly one plane – one has control, as in the instructor – he presses a button on his radio and the student takes control so we don’t crash planes – because they’re not cheap.”

“Nine times out of 10, they get their own plane and love it.”

You can find the group at the Morgan

Park Complex – where they have 30 acres, a clubhouse, full-blown flying strip and a helicopter area.

“We love it – it’s not a home away from home but it’s where we can have a proper clubhouse, proper meeting and give ourselves sausages in bread after flying as we have a slab,” he said.

“We have fabulous facilities, we are really looked after here at Warwick.”

“It’s not a competitive thing, not a dog eat dog environment, it’s just you flying the plane you like be it a foamy – there’s some fabulous cheap planes that are just made out of what I call bean bags – beautiful planes. They’re very accessible, not expensive. Then you get ARF – almost ready to fly planes – where you just have to go to the hobby shop buy one, take it home and put it together (from whole pieces) and go fly it. Then we have the build-up kits for the serious person who just loves his building – that’s what I do probably more than anything else but that’s because I’ve been at it all my life.”

So how many models does he have?

“Oh we don’t talk about that – not when the wife’s listening but the answer is probably 50 or 60 or 70 – too many,” he laughed.

“I don’t sell mine I just collect them, love looking at them and get them flying. I have big ones – I’m a bit older and I can see them a lot better.”

He said it’s so important to be creative and do something that you love and nurtures the soul.

Prospective members can find them via their website and facebook – or wander out – they have specific club dates advertised on their gates – Wednesdays or at least Sunday (the official club days) and probably Saturday’s but there is often someone there at other times.

Warwick Aero Modellers are located five minutes from the centre of town and lease land within the Morgan Park Sporting Complex.

Members fly most Sundays with a BBQ lunch on every first and third Sunday of the month.



WAM is home of Queensland Scanner Racing and generally hold events every second month, weather permitting.
